Floodplain Permits

All developments within the 100-yr. floodplain (not just construction of buildings, but filling, excavation, fences, etc.) are required to obtain a City of St. Charles Permit. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area. Contact the City of St. Charles Public Works Engineering Division for information at 630-377-4486 or www.stcharlesil.gov/flood. You may report illegal development activities to the above number as well.

Police Chief James Lamkin Retires

James Lamkin has announced he will retire as Chief of the St. Charles Police Department effective Dec. 27, 2013, after serving in that role for 10 years. Lamkin has accepted the position of Chief of Police with the Village of Schaumburg, Ill., effective Dec. 30, 2013. Chief Lamkin has more than 38 years in law enforcement. Prior to coming to St. Charles, he served as Deputy Chief of the Elgin Police Department.

Of his tenure in St. Charles, Chief Lamkin said: “These past ten years have been a wonderful opportunity for me to grow personally and professionally. St. Charles is a great community with much to offer our residents and visitors. As Chief of Police, I have enjoyed our accomplishments and give credit to all the staff at the Police Department, both sworn and non-sworn. I am very proud of everyone for their service to the community and for always respecting those we serve.”

Chief Lamkin has served under three Mayors and three City Administrators. His commitment to elevating the safety and security of the community is evident by the steady decrease in calls to the Police Department for service over the last several years, with the number of calls at their lowest since 2001. This is a notable achievement, especially during a time of tightened budgets during the recession of the past few years.

Enhancing officers’ tactical abilities and knowledge was an important initiative under Chief Lamkin. In 2012, the Police Department completed a new, full-service firing range for regular firearm practice and training. The new range has become a valuable resource for the St. Charles



Police Department and 21 other area police departments and two specialized teams who regularly utilize the facility.

And, as chair of the Tri-Com Board, Chief Lamkin promoted a spirit of collaboration among local law enforcement agencies to maximize resources and improve services to the community.

City Administrator Mark Koenen expressed appreciation for Chief Lamkin’s accomplishments: “I have worked with Jim over his 10 years at the City and am impressed with the relationships he has built both within the City and among local organizations. This has resulted in first-rate emergency response to incidents within the community. I wish him well in future professional endeavors.”

Chief Lamkin sits on the boards of several organizations, including Tri-Com, Kane County Emergency Telephone Systems, Northeastern Multi-Regional Training, and the North Central Narcotics Task Force.

“I have worked hard to develop an excellent staff who will continue to serve the community in the years to come. I know I am leaving St. Charles in good hands,” Chief Lamkin said.

An interim appointment will be named.

Prevent Holiday Shopping Crime

The Police Department offers these tips to protect against shopping crimes this holiday season:

1. Pay attention to your valuables at all times and avoid distractions, such as talking on your cell phone or listening to an MP3 player.
 2. Wear your purse diagonally across the front or place your wallet in a front pocket.
 3. Do not carry large sums of cash.
 4. Beware of strangers who approach you or bump into you.
 5. Conceal your PIN during credit/debit card transactions.
 6. Throngs of shoppers can lead to frustrations or rage. If you find yourself in a mob scene, remain calm and carefully move to the outside of the mob. Search out protective barriers like walls, and avoid bottlenecks.
 7. Never park in an unlit or poorly lit parking lot.
 8. Never leave packages visible inside your car. Store them in the trunk instead.
 9. Have your keys in hand when approaching your car and don’t leave items unattended while loading the car.
 10. Check your account balances frequently for unauthorized purchases, and report lost or stolen cards immediately.
- “Shoppers really need to keep track of their valuables and be aware of who is around them at all times,” warns Bill Tynan, Crime Prevention Officer in the St. Charles Police Department. “Turning your back briefly on your shopping bag or a purse resting in a shopping cart is all the time a criminal needs to take those items.” For more information, visit www.stcharlesil.gov/public-safety or contact Bill Tynan, Crime Prevention Officer, at 630-443-3847.



Holiday Refuse Services



No Changes to Refuse Pick-Up for the Holidays

There will be regularly scheduled refuse pick up on Dec. 24 & Dec. 31.

Christmas Tree Pick Up

Christmas trees will be picked up during the weeks of January 6 & 13, 2014, on **BOTH** sides of the river on the regularly scheduled refuse day. **After the two week period, a sticker will be required for pick up.**

Trees are **NOT** to be placed in disposal bags. Residents should note that all decorations, including tinsel, must be removed.

Brush, Leaf & Yard Waste Collection

Brush, leaf and yard waste collection has concluded for 2013. Collection will resume April 2014.

City Crews are Prepared for Winter Weather

Public Works staff is prepared to maintain safe road conditions for our community this winter. The foundation of our successful snow program has been the ability to mobilize our equipment and personnel for any storm event, including light or heavy snowfall and ice storms.

Our plowing and deicing operations tackle the main routes, connector roads, school zones and downtown areas first to keep the majority of traffic and emergency routes cleared. Once these areas are cleared and safe for travel, City crews and contractors begin clearing neighborhood streets, cul-de-sacs, alleys and parking lots.

• **Weather.** Many of our functions are weather dependent. The city uses a computerized forecasting system to monitor the weather. This system alerts staff to incoming weather systems by type (snow, ice, etc.), and gives information about duration and expected onset. It also provides treatment recommendations customized to our snow program.

• Brine.

The City uses brine as a pre-wetting application before most snowfalls. The brine provides a buffer between the street

surface and the snow which aids in removal. The city produces its own brine, which is a mixture of salt, water and a commercial product that lowers the temperature range for which brine is effective. The brine is applied to the streets from a liquid tank truck which spreads the material across the pavement when snow or ice is expected. - Kirk Road south of Rt. 64


All other city streets are maintained by the City of St. Charles Public Works Department, 630-377-4405.

Anti-icing/salting and plowing operations are all parts of the City's snow plan program. City personnel maintain the nearly 171 lane miles of main, secondary, alleys, side streets, parking lots and cul-de-sacs. Citizen cooperation and understanding will greatly enhance the efforts to provide the best service possible.

Helpful Winter Reminders

Snow Plow Safety

City staff is gearing up for another northern Illinois winter. They are preparing the equipment and making sure de-icing supplies are ready to keep City streets safe and clear throughout the winter. Around-the-clock crews are ready to respond to winter weather conditions. Here's what you can do to help:



- Remind children to stay clear of snowplows.
- When driving, stay back at least 100 feet from moving plows and do not pass.
- Drivers, remember to yield the right of way to any vehicle displaying flashing lights and engaged in construction, maintenance, snow plowing or salting work.
- Do not place snow removed from driveways and sidewalks in the street. It creates dangerous situations for others and violates city ordinances.
- Clear snow and ice from the walk adjacent to your property. This makes pedestrian travel safer and easier.
- Clear snow away from fire hydrants to permit easy access in case of emergency.
- Pile snow away from the edge of the road, on the left side of the driveway as you face the house. Should the snowplow pass by again, this will prevent the plow from pushing snow back into your driveway.
- If you believe your mailbox was hit by a City plow, contact Public Works at 630-377-4405, Mon-Fri., 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or email pw@stcharlesil.gov.
- Please remove any objects that overhang the curbs e.g., portable basketball hoops.
- Do not park on streets after 2" a snowfall; the Police Department will begin enforcing the parking regulations one hour after the 2" accumulation.

Avoid Frozen Pipes

To avoid frozen water pipes, allow heated air to circulate around pipes and meters. Latch basement windows and vents to prevent drafts on pipes. When remodeling, do not locate water pipes against exterior concrete walls. If pipes have been frozen in the past, insulate problem areas and leave cabinet doors open. Be Prepared for Winter Weather

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency and the National Weather Service are encouraging people to prepare for winter emergencies. The agencies joined with the American Red Cross to develop a Winter Weather Preparedness guide that includes tips for staying safe at home, in the car and at work or school. Download the guide at www.ready.illinois.gov.

"An emergency situation does not need to be a large magnitude to be life threatening," said Paul Bumba, Emergency Preparedness Coordinator with the City of St. Charles. "It can be as personal as being without power in your home for an extended period of time or being stranded on a roadway overnight during a severe winter storm or weather event. We urge citizens to take the proper precautions before the cold weather hits."

According to the IEMA and NWS, a home emergency supply kit should be stocked with items to last at least three days and should include a battery-powered weather alert radio, a flashlight, extra batteries, non-perishable food, water, a first-aid kit, extra medications and special items needed for babies, disabled or elderly family members and family pets.



They also suggest preparing a vehicle emergency kit to help stay safe and warm until help arrives. It should include a cell phone and charger, flashlight, extra batteries, first-aid kit, snack foods and water, blankets, extra clothing, gloves and hats, sand or kitty litter, shovel, windshield scraper and a tool kit.
