Electric Vehicle Charging Available in the 1st Street Garage

Residents Can Charge their Cars While Shopping or Dining Downtown

St. Charles now is plugged into the green community even more with the recent installation of an Electric Vehicle Charger. The Charge Point, Level 2 charger now is available on the fourth floor of the 1st Street Parking Garage at 1st and Illinois streets. The dual charging unit is available to residents to charge their electric vehicles free for up to two hours.

The technology allows users to monitor station availability and receive notifications about the progress of their charging through a mobile app. It also puts St. Charles on a map of national network of charging stations.

The City received a 50 percent matching grant from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to install the \$12,000 unit. City Administrator Mark Koenen likes that visitors to our downtown can be thinking green while they spend some green: “We feel the station not only benefits our residents, but it is another plus for our City and downtown and further strengthens our commitment to embracing greener technologies.”

Special thanks to Nissan of St. Charles, Don McCue Chevrolet and resident Julia Davies for bringing their electric cars for demonstration at the charging station ribbon cutting.

Tungare to Lead Community and Economic Development

The St. Charles City Council approved Rita Tungare as Director of Community Development and Economic Development, merging the two departments into one, at its Dec. 16 meeting.

In addition to executing the rewrite of the City's Comprehensive Plan, Tungare has been instrumental in managing complex redevelopment projects for the City, including First Street, Lexington Club, Eastgate Commons and Charlestowne Mall. In her new position, she will direct a coordinated and efficient development process with a one-stop customer friendly experience.

"The decision to recommend Rita for this position was made after careful consideration of many factors, including the requirements and responsibilities of these two important City functions," said City Administrator Mark Koenen. "I have worked with Rita over her 13-plus years with the City and know she has the skills and abilities to lead the department into the future."

Tungare joined the City in 2000 as a community planner. She was promoted to Senior Planner in 2001, Assistant Director of Community Development in 2006 and Director in 2008. Prior to joining the City of St. Charles, Tungare worked as a senior planner for the Village of Addison. Tungare holds a Master of Urban Planning and Policy from the University of Illinois at Chicago, a Master of Architecture from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and a Bachelor of Architecture from the University of Bombay, India. She also holds accreditation from the American Institute of Certified Planners.

Recruitment has begun for an Economic Development Division Manager.



Another Shop St. Charles Winner


Supporting the Local Economy

Huffman Named Interim Police Chief

Steven Huffman has been appointed Interim Chief of the St. Charles Police Department, effective Dec. 27. Huffman has served in the department for 20 years, most recently as Deputy Chief of Administration.

Huffman's appointment comes after outgoing Chief James Lamkin announced his retirement from the St. Charles Police Department to accept the position of Chief of Police for the Village of Schaumburg, Ill.

The City will be seeking applications for the Chief of Police position after Jan. 1, 2014, with the goal to fill the position in the spring.

"Steve's appointment will provide excellent continuity during this time of transition," City Administrator Mark



Koenen said. "His experience, knowledge and commitment to the safety and security of the St. Charles community are evident in his many years here in the Police Department."

Huffman started with the St. Charles Police Department in 1993 as a patrol officer. He rose through the ranks, holding positions of Detective Sergeant in Charge of Investigations, Deputy Chief of Operations and most recently Deputy Chief of Administration. Prior to joining the department, Huffman was an Aviation Mechanic with the United States Marine Corps. Huffman holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice Administration from Columbia Southern University.

First-Ever "Shop with a Cop" Aims to be an Annual Event

It's Open Season on Potholes

Our Public Works crews are busy during the winter not only with snow and ice removal, but repairing potholes. Potholes can occur very quickly. Various factors may cause potholes to form, such as the freeze/thaw weather cycle; the introduction of chemicals, such as road salt; wear from snowplow blades; and constant heavy load movement of busy road traffic. With all this going on, potholes are inevitable.

Fortunately, the City of St. Charles Public Works Department is well-prepared to handle potholes. When a pothole is reported, crews will work to repair it by applying a material called cold patch as a temporary repair. Cold patch is a pliable temporary blacktop mix, which can be shoveled and groomed better in cold weather than the typical blacktop mix used during hot summer months. To repair a pothole, the crew will clean and prep the hole, then fill it with cold patch mix. The patch is then compacted so the roadway can be immediately opened to traffic. The process is quick and efficient.

Residents can assist the City by reporting potholes when they are noticed. When reporting a pothole, please describe the exact location, which will help us determine the type of equipment needed to complete the repair. If you see a pothole, please call Public Works at 630-377-4405, email pw@stcharlesil.gov or report it with St. Charles Connect mobile app.

PLEASE NOTE: Some St. Charles roads are maintained and repaired by the Kane County Department of Transportation, Illinois Department of Transportation or St. Charles Township. The City's Public Works team can assist in identifying the appropriate area of responsibility for the repair and maintenance of our roadways.

Weathering a Winter Storm

Winter safety is a consideration indoors and out this time of year. Ice and heavy snow can bring down tree limbs and power lines. Make sure you know how to weather the storm. Keep these safety tips in mind.

Outside Tips

- Stay away from downed power lines.
- A power line does not need to be sparking or arcing to be energized; equipment near power lines also can be energized and dangerous.
- Assume all low and downed lines are energized and dangerous. If you see a downed or sagging line, contact the St. Charles Electric Division at 630-377-4407.
- Motorists should never drive over a downed line. Snagging a line could pull down a pole or other equipment and cause other hazards.
- Be careful approaching intersections where traffic or crossing lights may be out.



Inside Tips

- Before a winter storm, you should have supplies on hand, and know how to stay warm.
- If you plan to use a generator, know how to operate it safely.
- Always keep a battery-powered radio or TV, flashlights, a supply of fresh batteries, water, blankets and non-perishable food.
- When power goes out, it often comes back in spikes. This can damage electronics. So unplug them when the power goes out. Leave one lamp or switch on as a signal for when your power returns.



- To prevent water pipes from freezing, keep faucets turned on slightly so that water drips from the tap. Know how to shut off water valves in case a pipe bursts.

- If your power is out, keep warm by staying inside and dress warmly in layered clothing. Close off unneeded rooms. If

you live with a child or elderly person, you may need to take them somewhere with power so they can stay warm. When using an alternate heat source, follow operating instructions, use fire safeguards and be sure to properly ventilate. More at www.stcharlesil.gov.

Winter Safety Messages

Home Heating Fire Safety

- In 2011, space heaters accounted for one-third of home heating fires. Keep anything that can catch fire at least three feet away.
- Make sure your alternative heaters have 'tip switches,' designed to automatically turn off the heater if it tips over.
- Kerosene heaters may not be legal in your area and should only be used where approved by authorities.
- Only use the type of fuel recommended by the manufacturer and follow suggested guidelines.
- Never refill a space heater while it is operating or still hot. Refuel heaters only outdoors.
- Do not use the kitchen oven range to heat your home. In addition to being a fire hazard, it can be a source of toxic fumes.
- Some smoke alarms may be dependent on your home's electrical service and could be inoperative during a power outage. Check to see if your smoke alarm uses a back-up battery and install a new battery at least once a year.
- If there is a fire hydrant near your home, keep it clear of snow, ice and debris for easy access by the fire department.

Hypothermia

When exposed to cold temperatures, your body begins to lose heat faster than it can be produced. Prolonged exposure to cold will eventually use up your body's stored energy. The result is hypothermia, or abnormally low body temperature.

- Body temperature that is too low affects the brain, making the victim unable to think clearly or move well.
- Hypothermia is most likely at very cold temperatures, but it can occur even at cool temperatures (above 40°F) if a person becomes chilled from rain, sweat, or submersion in cold water.
- Warnings signs of hypothermia:
 - o shivering, exhaustion
 - o confusion, fumbling hands
 - o memory loss, slurred speech
 - o drowsiness
- If you notice any of these signs, and the person's temperature is below 95°, the situation is an emergency—get medical attention immediately.

The City again is offering trees for planting in the parkway through its “50/50 Parkway Tree Planting Program.” Please contact the Public Works department to request a review of your parkway if you are interested in participating. All requests must have an approved parkway review before an order will be placed. Please do not send payment at this time. Once approved, residents will receive a confirmation letter, approved order form, and details on how to order a parkway tree.

Guidelines

1. To begin the Approval Process, complete the form below and send it to the City of St. Charles Public Works Department, Attn: Public Services, 2 E. Main Street, St. Charles, IL 60174
2. Once we receive your completed pre-order form, a Public Services team member will conduct a parkway review to determine tree spacing, soil condition and existing underground utilities. All of these factors impact planting a new tree. Our team looks forward to helping you select the best tree for your parkway.
3. After the parkway review, a letter is sent detailing approval status. If your request has been approved, you also will receive an order form and instructions on where to send your order with payment.
4. If at any time you have questions, please contact Public Works at 630-377-4405.

Pre-Order forms received as of March 1 will be considered for planting in the spring. Forms received by August 1 will be considered for planting in the fall.
