## Are You Getting Unwanted Papers Delivered to Your House?

Recently, residents have complained about companies delivering unwanted newspapers to their homes. The issue is that these publications can pile up, especially if a resident is on vacation or unable to get out and pick them up off the driveway. The City is looking into whether or not it has any authority over this practice. In the meantime, residents who do not want the newspapers delivered are encouraged to:

1. Contact the companies by phone and letter to demand the deliveries stop. Keep a record of the phone call, who you spoke to, and a copy of the letter you sent.
2. Post a notice on your property indicating the material is not wanted.

# City Employees Serve the Community On and Off the Clock

A “Giving Spirit” is one of the reasons St. Charles was named #1 City for Families by Family Circle magazine. Proud examples of the many ways people give back can be found throughout our community.

Among the groups that donate their time, talent and resources are City of St. Charles employees. Both individually and collectively, the 303 employees of the City make a tremendous impact within St. Charles’ borders and beyond. Last year, City employees donated more than \$11,000 in contributions and gifts and worked countless volunteer hours to support more than 50 local and national nonprofit organizations.



## Small Acts, Big Impacts

“We hear about City employees who go above and beyond in their jobs every day,” said Kathy Livernois, Director of Human Resources at the City. “But the success of the City-organized charity initiatives year after year shows how City staff serves the community on a personal level too. These employees reflect compassion, unselfish caring and generosity in their giving of time and contributions.”

Throughout the year, the City conducts several philanthropic programs in which staff participates:

- **Giving Friday**

Employees make charitable donations of \$6 or more to dress casually at work two Fridays each month. (Uniformed employees can still make a charitable donation.) Proceeds from each Giving Friday benefit a named charity.

- **Combined Charities**

Employees donate to various charities through payroll deductions.

- **The Giving Tree**

Holiday presents are donated for families in need.

- **Neighbors in Need**

Contributions help St. Charles residents in need pay their utility bills.

## Brush Pick Up Schedule

### East Side

June 17

Brush (branches at least 3 ft. in length and less than 12” in diameter) must be placed on the parkway in front of the house (or along the frontage where refuse/recycling is collected), with cut ends facing the street, before 7 a.m.

Do not tie bundles of brush with rope or wire. Brush must not be piled higher than 4 ft. and never piled in the street. Also, please do not park cars in front of the piles; crews will be unable to pick up the brush.

Brush also can be placed in paper yard waste bags for pick-up with regular refuse. Either bags with the City logo or generic bags can be used. Generic bags require one refuse sticker per bag.

## Students Dig Right In to Help Care for Langum Woods



Students from Haines Middle School learned about the value of natural areas and got a firsthand look at what it takes to care for our local parks on a recent day in May. They pulled weeds, cleared pathways, removed fallen branches and brush, replanted displaced specimens and spread mulch at Langum Woods.

This is the third year the kids have participated in the Langum Woods clean-up project. The effort is coordinated by the St. Charles Park District and the St. Charles Tree Commission.

## Storm Flooding Prevention



The Public Works Division offers the following precautions to avoid storm flooding:

- Do not stack, dump or rake leaves, grass clippings or yard waste into the street or curb line. This potentially could cause street flooding during heavy rains. Dispose with the appropriate yard waste bags or compost the landscape waste materials.
- Inspect your roof for missing or curling shingles, and for flashing that is loose or needs to be sealed.
- Be sure gutters and down spouts are clean. Install extensions on down spouts to help drain water away from the building foundation.
- Make sure the ground next to the house has the proper pitch so surface water is shed away from the foundation.
- Keep trees and bushes trimmed away from the house so when they blow in the wind, they don't cause wear on the roof, siding or trim. Trimmed landscaping also improves airflow and can help prevent moisture problems.

**NOTE:** Never dispose of any liquids into street drains or curb lines; storm inlets all drain directly to the river. Notify the City at 630-377-4405 if a spill or dumping is observed.

## Are You Eligible for Disaster Assistance?

Kane County residents affected by the severe storms and flooding between April 16 and May 5 are eligible to register for federal disaster assistance.

Individual Assistance for homeowners and renters can include grants to help pay for temporary rental assistance, home repairs and other serious disaster-related expenses not met by insurance or other assistance programs. Also, low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration are available to cover residential and business losses not fully compensated by insurance.

The deadline to register for FEMA disaster assistance is July 9. Register online at [www.disasterassistance.gov](http://www.disasterassistance.gov) or call 800-621-3362, or (TTY) 800-462-7585.

## What to do After a Storm

When a severe storm hits, it can create potential electrical hazards. It's important to keep these post-storm safety tips in mind:

- If you must venture out after a severe storm, stay away from downed power lines and be aware that tree limbs or debris may hide a potential electrical hazard. If you encounter any dangling wires, downed or hanging power lines, treat them as if they are energized. Warn others to stay away, and contact the St. Charles Electric Utility at 630-377-4407.
- When driving, be careful at intersections where traffic lights are out. Stop at all railroad crossings, and treat road intersections with traffic signals as four-way stops before proceeding with caution.
- Before re-entering storm-damaged buildings or rooms, be sure all electric and gas services are turned off. Never attempt to turn off power at the breaker box if you must stand in water to do so. If you can't reach your breaker box safely, call the electric utility to shut off power at the meter.
- Never step into a flooded basement or other area if water is covering electrical outlets, appliances, or cords. Be alert to any electrical equipment that could be energized and in contact with water. Never touch electrical appliances, cords, or wires while you are wet or standing in water.
- Cleaning up and using water-damaged appliances also carries safety risks. Electric motors in appliances that have been drenched or submerged should be thoroughly cleaned and reconditioned before they are put back into service. It may be necessary to repair or replace electrical appliances or tools that have been in contact with water. Do not use any water-damaged appliance until a professional has checked it out.
- If you are going to use electric yard tools in clean-up efforts, do not operate them if it is raining, the ground is wet, or if you are wet or standing in water. Keep electric equipment at least 10 feet from wet areas.
- When using a generator, follow all manufacturers' recommendations. Keep the generator dry, and never plug it into a wall outlet or directly into the home's wiring. This could inadvertently energize the utility lines and injure yourself or others who are working to restore power.

**Goodwill** - Drop off locations for clothes and household items are at 2750 East Main Street, St. Charles, 630-513-5681, and 450 North Randall Road, Batavia, 630-761-8049.

**Habitat for Humanity ReStore** - They will take used building materials, furniture, electronics and small appliances. Drop off locations are at 800 N. State St./Rt. 31, Elgin, 847-742-9905, and 4100 Fox Valley Center Dr., Aurora, 630-585-5508.

**Naperville Fire Station #4**, - Drop off batteries (and other household hazardous waste) at 1971 Brookdale Road, Naperville, every Saturday and Sunday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. (except holidays).

**Kane County Monthly Collection** - Books for any ages, in any condition, paperback or hardcover, will be assessed for reuse and redistribution or recycling. Bring to 540 S. Randall Road, St. Charles, on the second Saturday of each month, 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

**St. Charles Electronics Recycling Container** - Bring household electronics to the Public Works Facility, 1405 S. 7th Ave., Monday- Friday, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., 630-377-4405.



**Recycle My Fridge Program** - The Illinois Municipal Electric Agency and the Appliance Recycling Centers of America, Inc., offer this program that picks up of old refrigerators and freezers from residents for free. For more information contact the St. Charles Electric Utility, 630-377-4407. Call **Advanced Disposal** for pick-up of non-working refrigerators and freezers, 630-587-8282.

**AutoZone** - Motor oil drop off locations are at 209 Randall Road, South Elgin, 847-429-1095, and 1283 North Lake St., Aurora, 630-966-8940. Also, at

**Valvoline Instant Oil Change**, 2076 West Main Street, Batavia, 630-406-7956. Amounts less than one gallon of motor oil also may be recycled through **Advanced Disposal**. Put motor oil in sealed plastic containers (such as milk or laundry detergent containers) and place at the curb on the ground next to your recycling bin on regular garbage pick-up days.

**Earth Paint Collection Systems** - Recycles opened cans of liquid latex paint, 847-231-6044. Also, **dried** latex paint can be placed in your regular household trash.
