Officer Tim Beam received a **Lifesaving Award** for alerting sleeping residents to evacuate their home after lightning started their roof on fire.

Officer Jeff Finley received the **Distinguished Service Award** for 40 years with the St. Charles Police Department. Officer Finley joined the St. Charles Police Department on August 19, 1974, and has served the people of St. Charles ever since.

Officer Timothy Ocasek received a **Life Saving Award** for quickly responding to an incident and performing CPR on a subject until emergency medical help arrived.

Historical Spotlight: The St. Charles Fire Department



For 172 years, the St. Charles Fire Department has proudly served the residents and businesses of our community. Originally formed in 1842 as the Lafayette Fire Company, the charter included 56 members. Their services were in demand—back then everything from the buildings to the bridges and sidewalks were made of wood.

In 1888, the St. Charles Fire Department officially was created under municipal ordinance and battled the years. Eventually replaced horse-drawn rescue truck complete stretcher, blankets was added to the courtesy of the VFW

Today the St. Charles has highly trained, and is a fully accredited agency. Last year, the department responded to 4282 calls for fires, rescue and emergency medical services, and other safety incidents.

The Fire Department put together a wonderful book chronicling its history for its 150th Anniversary in 1992. The book is available to purchase through the Heritage Center. Come to the Fire Department Open House October 19

The St. Charles Fire Department is hosting an Open House Sunday, Oct. 19 from noon to 3 p.m. at Fire Station 1, 112 N. Riverside Avenue.

There will be something for everyone, including tours of the fire station, a Kid's Firefighter Challenge, equipment displays and safety exhibits from participating vendors. The Department's Special Teams will demonstrate extrication equipment, technical rescue operations and dive operations. The program will conclude with a live burn demonstration that highlights the effect of sprinklers in controlling structure fires.

Storm Sewers and Leaves

The City's storm sewer system is critical to protecting property and roadways from flooding during rain storms. But the storm sewers can't work if leaves and litter block grates and inlets.

Be sure to keep storm grates clear. Never place leaves for pick up on the street or in the curb. Not only does that result in material collecting around the grates, it also is a violation of City Code, subject to a fine up to \$500.

Flood Warning

At times, flooding can be predicted days in advance, giving ample warning for preparation and evacuation. However, in the event of a flash flood due to large storms or ice jams, you may be the first to notice the oncoming situation. Residents are encouraged to notify the Police Department of flooding conditions and the police will contact the city's Emergency Management Agency. For additional information on local conditions, listen for radio and television alerts, and check the weather online.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

The last yard waste collection for 2014 by Advanced Disposal will be the week of Nov. 24 on your regular day. Collection will resume April 2015.

Hydrant Flushing Concludes October 10

Hydrant flushing improves water quality and minimizes mineral build-up in the water mains. It also ensures that hydrants are ready for emergency use.

Fall Hydrant Flushing Schedule

September 29 - October 3 - Hydrant flushing begins on the west side of the Fox River south of the Timbers subdivision, and continues south to Gray Street and west to North/South 16th Street.



October 6 - October 10 - Hydrant flushing will begin on the east side of the Fox River south of Iroquois Avenue, and continues south to Division Street and east to North/South 14th Avenue.

Please watch for signs announcing hydrant flushing in specific areas. Also, for approximate dates in your neighborhood, visit the My Neighborhood section of the City website, www.stcharlesil.gov. Click [here](#) for a hydrant flushing map.

Water is safe to use and consume during hydrant flushing, however, residents may temporarily experience rusty-colored water. During hydrant flushing:

- If possible, limit water use.
- If water is rust-colored, wait until flushing has subsided, then turn on the cold water tap until water runs clear.
- Rust-colored water may stain laundry. Keep stained clothes wet and treat them with stain remover, available free of charge at **Public Works**, 1405 South 7th Ave.; **City Hall**, Reception Desk, 2 East Main St.; or at the **Police Department**, 211 North Riverside Ave.

While hydrants may not be a preferred landscape feature, they are essential for keeping our city safe. City Code 16.08.070 Public Utilities, D.6. Water Supply General Requirements, describes the parameters for landscaping around hydrants. Please allow a minimum of 10 feet around hydrants for trees; 5 feet for bushes and shrubs; and for all other landscaping please refer to the **Engineering Design and Inspection Policy Manual** on the City's website.

2014 Leaf Pick Up Schedule



EAST SIDE	WEST SIDE

Please Note: Pick up is not available for Cumberland Green, Whittington Course, Royal Fox private streets, Dunham Place Commons, Delnor Townhomes, Delnor Glen Drive, Willowgate Viewpointe, Wildrose Townhomes, Auburn Court, Benham Court, and Oak Crest.

The leaf pick up program has been modified this year. It will run similarly to the brush pick up program, with the collection areas divided on the east and west sides of the river. Leaves must be on the parkway by 6:30 a.m. on your area's designated day of pick up, but it may take three to four days before the leaves are picked up in your specific area.

Leaf Collection Tips

- Leaf piles will not be picked up if obstructed by parked vehicles or other obstacles. The piles will be picked on your next scheduled pick up when the obstruction is removed.
- Please keep a distance of approximately 10' between leaf piles and permanent structures e.g., fire hydrants, trees, streetlight poles, etc.
- Rake leaves in a row parallel to the street at least 1' back from the curb and off the sidewalk.
- Inclement weather or a large volume of leaves could alter the leaf pickup schedule.
- **Pushing leaves into the street is a violation of Ordinance 12.04.170, punishable by a fine up to \$500.00 for each offense.**
- Leaf piles will not kill grass, although they may cause it to discolor.
- Avoid raking foreign materials into leaf piles as these could damage equipment or injure personnel.
- This program is funded by a portion of the fee collected on the utility bill of eligible homeowners living within the city limits of St. Charles. Check your utility bill or call Utility Billing at [630.377.4426](tel:630.377.4426), if you have a question regarding your eligibility for this program.

Also, yard waste bag pickup by Advance Disposal ends the week of November 24.

Placement of Brush and Leaves for Pick Up

Just a reminder to residents, leaves and brush piles should be placed on the address side of your property. City Ordinance 8.24.030 states 'If available, yard waste shall be placed on the parkway, adjacent to and on the address side of the property from where the yard waste is gathered. If a parkway is not available adjacent to a property or on the address side of a property, the Director of Public Works or designee shall identify an area for collection.' Final Brush Pick Ups this Year

There are two remaining brush collections this year for residents who live within the City of St. Charles limits.

Brush (branches at least 3 feet in length and less than 12 inches in diameter) must be placed on the parkway, in front of your house (or along the frontage where refuse/recycling is collected), cut ends facing the street before 7 a.m. on Monday of the scheduled pick up (or Tuesday if Monday is a holiday). Please note: Pick up in your area may take 3 to 4 days to complete.

Do not tie bundles of brush with rope or wire. Piles should not be higher than 4 feet and never put in the street. Don't park in front of the piles, crews will be unable to pick up the brush.
