A. “Do Not Text and Drive Day” – March 21, 2012:

- Susan Schwerdtfeger reports that the two St. Charles High Schools have selected March 21, 2012. The Mayor of St. Charles will proclaim this day “Do Not Text and Drive Day” in St. Charles. This will be announced at the March 19, 2012 City Council Meeting. Thumb rings are not feasible. Discussion regarding window clings for interior of car windows. 

Teens were the core of our services at our founding in 1967. Working with teenagers continues to be a specialty of TriCity Family Services and, at this time, the population where our expertise and compassion are most needed in this community. Teens are the heart of our agency and they need our help.

The teen years are a critical time for brain and social function and development. Every teen is “at risk” in some capacity. The three leading causes of death among adolescents are accidents, homicide and suicide. Mental health treatment can prevent all of these disasters.

Teens in 2012 are simply our highest priority.

- ADHD
- Sexual abuse and assault
- Social Phobia
- Body image
- Adjustment problems
- Depression
- Drugs and alcohol abuse
- Self Injury

Many mental health disorders in teens go unnoticed or are misdiagnosed. Left unaddressed, issues can lead to bigger issues and more serious problems that can plague a teenager for their lifetime.

The **Teens Won't Wait Project** needs to raise \$200,000 over current agency fundraising goals. This is what it will take to ensure that teens in our community get the treatment, services, experiences and support they need.

COUNSELING – \$100,000

TriCity Family Services' family-centered counseling program is effective in reaching teens. When faced with a wait list, however, families stop asking for help. Help us serve more teenagers and their families this year. With this critical increase to our counseling funding, we will eliminate our wait list and ensure that teens truly won't wait to get the help they need.

GROUP PROGRAMS – \$50,000

Our innovative group programs engage teenagers, get them out of their element, build self-esteem, positive peer relationships, and life skills. Those who participate demonstrate outstanding outcomes across the board. We need to get more teens into these programs. They are:

Wilderness Challenge Program

The definitive camping and canoeing adventure for teens

Giving teens the experience of an 8-day therapeutic adventure in the boundary waters of northern Minnesota and Canada. With a follow up group that spans the school year, Wilderness Challenge alumni can take advantage of a positive peer group experience through the end of high school. More than 400 teens have passed through this program over the last two decades. We need to keep it growing.

Young Women's Retreat

The weekend of self-esteem building and peer support receiving rave reviews

Giving teen girls a retreat experience that increases their ability to engage in values-based positive behaviors, even while experiencing difficult thoughts, emotions and sensations. Starting with emotional self-awareness, building to mindfulness skills, and culminating in assurance statements and tools for the challenges they face in life, this new and special weekend is already changing lives.

Mindful Emotions

The amazing 8-week class that helps teen girls face the road ahead

Giving teenage girls peer support and a full array of tools to communicate, problem solve and practice healthy coping strategies. With the support of their peers, girls develop skills for using mindfulness, positive feeling expression and healthy coping strategies. They work together on strengthening skills in communication, conflict-resolution, problem-solving and respecting others. This engaging class strengthens teen girls in critical ways for a lifetime.

Smart Choices

The anger management class for teens that effectively saves families

Giving teens an anger management class on their own terms. Offered as an alternative to suspension with area junior high and high schools, this program also welcomes self-referrals from any family with teenagers. Sessions are facilitated for one family alone, offering privacy, personal attention, and the convenience of meeting on the home turf. Teens and their parents learn new ways to handle cycles of anger and change their family forever.

MAUDSLEY TREATMENT FOR EATING DISORDERS – \$50,000

Family-centered treatment for eating disorders is a major service gap in our community. Teenagers with eating disorders currently have to travel out of our community to get the innovative and family-centered treatment they need. The Maudsley Method has been shown to be effective in providing the intensive therapy needed to address life-threatening eating disorders in teens. TriCity Family Services seeks to bring this unique and effective therapy to the TriCity community.
