

A TRIBUTE TO MARY BARTH

This past year we lost Mary Barth, a dear friend of the agency and a fixture of our annual William D. Barth Award dinner. Mary Barth, 89, formerly of St. Charles, passed away peacefully on Monday, March 19, 2012, at Woodcrest at Blakeford Nursing Center in Nashville. She was born August 9, 1922 in Lebanon, IN, the daughter of Clarence and Audra Hull. She was united marriage to William Barth on May 13, 1944 in Joplin, MO.

Mary took great pride in being a loving wife and mother, a giving neighbor and friend. Over the years, she was very involved in her children's lives, including being a Girl Scout leader, school volunteer and attending virtually all of their after-school activities. She was also a hospital volunteer and district president in United Methodist Women, often working tirelessly behind the scenes to make St. Charles, her community, a better place to live.

We remember her today as a devoted supporter of TriCity Family Services along with her husband, William, one of our ten agency founding fathers. Long after Bill passed away, however, Mary stayed involved and supportive, frequently appearing at the agency front desk with fresh baked cookies for the staff and playing an integral role in our annual William D. Barth Award tradition.

Below are quotes and remembrances submitted by friends and loved ones of Mary Barth for this occasion:

"Long after Bill's death, Mary carried on his legacy as one of our agency founders. She was not only a generous supporter and volunteer, but even in her later years, was always gracious about playing a part in the presentation of the annual William D. Barth Award. One of my fondest memories of Mary was when she would stop by the office to deliver a plate of freshly made cookies for the staff, a wonderful nurturing gesture from someone who took care of the heart of the agency."—Jim Otepka

"Pat and I both have memories of what wonderful and giving neighbors the Barths were. When Pat's husband was taken to Rush-Presbyterian Hospital in Chicago for an emergency heart condition, Mary dropped everything to drive Pat to the hospital and to stay there with her. On the lighter side, the Barths borrowed the Ferris's pony to pull a sleigh so that Bill could arrive dressed as Santa for their grandchildren."--Pam Mann and Pat Ferris Hollis

"Mary was so supportive and full of praise for the work that the Friends did for TriCity Family Services. She always referred to her husband, Bill, and said he would have been so happy to know that the work of TriCity Family Services has touched so many lives. She had that huge smile that always made you feel welcome. And her eyes truly twinkled"-- Bobbi Alderfer

"Mary Barth was a very special person. Most of the time that I talked to her was when she was having a meal at the old Colonial Cafe on Rt. 38. She always wanted to know how my family was doing and how TriCity Family Services was doing. She was a caring person, full of life and always made me feel special when we had a conversation. She was a cheerleader and very positive person. I miss her very much."--Cris Anderson

"I asked Bill Barth to join the Finance Committee of our Board. He was setting up Arthur Anderson at the time and spending a lot of time out of town. He told me that when he was home he wanted to spend time with Mary and had to turn me down. I ended up putting both of them on the Finance Committee together. Decades later Mary asked me why I ever put her on that committee since she didn't understand what they were talking about half the time. I told her it was so she and Bill could spend more time together, and she laughed and laughed." --Jack Young

“Mary, to me, was such a ‘genteel’ lady—who stood behind her husband and family. Never asking recognition, but being the lovely Mary, who herself, touched so many along her road. I am grateful to have been her friend.”--Doris Hunt

“Anyone who really knew her could see her tremendous compassion for people. She was always asking Linda and me, ‘How can I help you?’ It was always her first response when we talked with her about our problems. Mom met a homeless lady at a Colonial Ice Cream store. She put her up in a hotel for a few days until other arrangements could be made. Returning from a family vacation at O’Hare Airport, Mom encountered a woman from the Philippines who had just arrived in the U.S. It was the middle of winter and the lady didn’t have a coat. Mom gave the woman her coat. For her family and good friends, Mom’s compassion left us with a great legacy.”—Doug Barth

“The day before her death, my brother took mother to a restaurant and taped her clapping and swaying to a live band, which was playing there that day. Obviously, neither of them knew what would occur the following day when mother gracefully left us to rejoin her true love, my father. The video shows Mom to a T, smiling, laughing and full of life. I was unbelievably fortunate to have grown up in a home with such giving parents and role models.”—Karen (Barth) Copeland

CAROLYN SPRAWKA

TriCity Family Services is honored to present the 28th annual William D. Barth Award to Carolyn Sprawka, of Batavia.

Carolyn's institutional, community, societal and humane achievements are innumerable. She has devoted her life to the service of people who are homeless in the Fox Valley area and is a long-standing defender of those who are in positions of struggle. Carolyn has served as President of the Board of Directors of Hesed House for the past 17 years and has steered the agency in significant expansions and improvements in services with outstanding leadership, wisdom and ethics.

Carolyn has also volunteered as the shift coordinator at the United Methodist Church of Geneva for both Hesed House and Lazarus House, organizing work teams from the church to consistently provide meal preparation and overnight supervision to the two area shelters. With her support and direction, the church teams have volunteered at Lazarus House and Hesed House for over 15 years. Carolyn also serves as Chairperson for the Committee on Church in Society at the Geneva United Methodist Church, educating the committee and larger church community not only about homelessness, but about related issues such as poverty, injustice and the immigration system. Most recently, Carolyn has also become involved in Fox Valley United, a new coalition of churches, corporations and not-for-profits working together to effect positive change and social justice in the Fox Valley area.

Her multiple leadership roles have been an inspiration to the community. Her advocacy has educated and informed hundreds of people about the needs of people who are homeless and how to form an intelligent community response to the issue of homelessness. Her leadership has inspired many others to cook, volunteer, or serve beyond their comfort zones. Her network of involvements has educated community members about the interconnectedness of us all and about our need to work together for the common good.

Carolyn's leadership roles have not removed her from the hands-on direct service she has embraced as a significant part of her daily life, however.

She has searched beneath the bridges of Aurora and Batavia for people who are homeless and invited them to Hesed House to receive the services and shelter they need. She is an active presence at Hesed House at least 1-2 times per week, and often 4-5 times per week. She regularly opens her home to the VISTA interns who complete stipend volunteer positions at Hesed House, inviting them to live with her for months at a time while they complete their year of service. At Lazarus House, she is frequently the lead volunteer chef of meal time and the overnight volunteer, sleeping on a mattress on the office floor. Carolyn has also orchestrated hands-on food rescue efforts in the community, being a weekly presence at many area restaurants and grocery stores picking up surplus and day-old commodities to be used at Hesed House and Lazarus House. At church, she also organizes Project Angel Tree, a Christmas collection partnership with the Salvation Army for families in need.

Carolyn's personal mission of service led her to work with others in the community to offer a home and comfort to those relocated to the Fox Valley area from areas along the Gulf Coast following Hurricane Katrina. She personally cared for a relocated mother and daughter, effectively organizing help for the housing, medical, financial, mental health and educational needs of this mother and daughter until they were able to return to Louisiana. In the same spirit of compassion, Carolyn single-handedly cared for an elderly Yugoslavian gentleman who was physically declining and she knew to be alone in this country with very limited English skills. Carolyn became his adopted daughter and caretaker, helping him receive subsidized senior housing, completing his taxes and all public paperwork, doing his weekly grocery shopping, taking him to doctor's visits, and ultimately handling all of his funeral arrangements.

Carolyn is a Hesed House volunteer for over 25 years, member of the Board of Directors for 20 years, and President of the Board of Directors for 17 years. She is Chairperson on the Committee on Church in Society at the United Methodist Church for 15 years. She is a member of the Illinois Coalition to End Homelessness. She has accomplished all of this while working full-time for Rempe-Sharpe Engineering Firm in Geneva.

Carolyn was nominated for this award by Nancie Lillie, a friend and admirer. TriCity Family Services is honored to present Carolyn Sprawka with the 2012 William D. Barth Award and to induct her into the distinguished ranks of William D. Barth Award winners.


