1 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: I would like to
2 call the St. Charles Liquor Commission to order.
3 Tina, would you call the roll.

4 MS. NILLES: Gehm.

5 MEMBER GEHM: Here.

6 MS. NILLES: Payleitner.

7 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: Here.

8 MS. NILLES: Amenta.

9 MEMBER AMENTA: Here.

10 MS. NILLES: Lewis.

11 MEMBER LEWIS: Here.

12 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: As an introduction
13 today, I'd like to start by saying that Section
14 5.08.030 of the St. Charles Municipal Code
15 provides that the local liquor control
16 commissioner may revoke for cause all local
17 liquor licenses issued to persons or entities for
18 premises within the city and to impose fines as
19 authorized in the St. Charles Municipal Code.

20 Both under the section cited above and
21 under Chapter 235, Section 5/7-5 of the Illinois
22 Compiled Statutes, the local liquor commissioner
23 is required to hold a public hearing after notice
24 to the licensee in which the licensee is afforded

1 an opportunity to appear and defend.

2 Pursuant to Section 5.08.030 and Section
3 5.08.035 of the St. Charles Municipal Code, this
4 hearing is being conducted by the Local Liquor
5 Commission at the request of the Local Liquor
6 Commissioner.

7 The Filling Station has been charged with a
8 violation of Section 5.08.250 of the St. Charles
9 Municipal Code in that on August 19th, 2013, it
10 allowed a patron to exit its premises while in
11 possession of an alcoholic beverage.

12 The penalty for such a violation in
13 addition or in lieu of a suspension for a
14 first-time offense, a fine can be imposed and
15 shall not exceed \$1,000.

16 The licensee has pleaded not guilty to the
17 citation.

18 For the record, the licensee is present
19 pursuant to notice.

20 And, Mr. Milligan, you are here today and
21 you acknowledge notice of the hearing.

22 MR. MILLIGAN: Correct.

23 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Do you have legal
24 counsel?

1 MR. MILLIGAN: No.

2 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: All right.

3 Representing Chief Lamkin in this matter is Tim
4 O'Neil, representing the Liquor Commissioner is
5 Doug Cascaden.

6 Now, the order of this hearing will be as
7 follows: The prosecution may present evidence in
8 its case with the right of the licensee to
9 cross-examine.

10 The licensee may present any defense or
11 mitigating evidence with the right of the
12 prosecution to cross-examine.

13 A summary of the case may be made by the
14 prosecution and the licensee. All witnesses that
15 are going to testify shall be sworn, and they
16 will sworn by the court reporter.

17 Strict rules of evidence will need not be
18 adhered to, although the Commission expects to
19 exercise control over this hearing to ensure that
20 repetitive testimony does not unduly prolong the
21 hearing. In other words, we'll try to stay
22 somewhat informal with this as much as possible.

23 A court reporter is present and will take
24 the proceedings verbatim, and the Commission,

1 members of the Commission certainly are
2 allowed -- and I would suppose it would be after
3 the lawyers ask questions. You certainly will be
4 allowed to ask any questions you want of any
5 witness, perfectly permitted.

6 So with that backdrop, unless I've missed
7 something here, I would ask the prosecutor to
8 call your first witness.

9 MR. O'NEIL: Thank you, your Honor.
10 Officer Runkle.

11 How about if we stand in between so I can
12 look at him, he can look me, and I can put my
13 little notes down here.

14 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: That will be fine.

15 MR. O'NEIL: Great. Thank you.

16 Sir, would you be sworn, please.

17 (Witness duly sworn.)

18 BRETT RUNKLE,
19 called as a witness by the Petitioner, having been
20 first duly sworn, was examined and testified as
21 follows:

22 DIRECT EXAMINATION

23 BY MR. O'NEIL:

24 Q Sir, would you state for the Commission your name

2 A Brett Runkle, 36 years old.

3 Q What is your occupation?

4 A Police officer.

5 Q By whom are you employed?

6 A City of St. Charles.

7 Q How long have you been a sworn peace officer for
8 the City of St. Charles?

9 A I'm in my ninth year now.

10 MR. O'NEIL: By the way, as a
11 housekeeping matter, your Honor, I believe the
12 charge states that on or about August 19th.

13 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: The case report
14 says 8/16.

15 MR. O'NEIL: Right. I believe what
16 you read into the record said August 19th. I
17 think that was the day it was --

18 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Let the record
19 reflect then we made that amendment to
20 August 16th, 2013.

21 MR. O'NEIL: Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Thank you, Counsel.

23 BY MR. O'NEIL:

24 Q Drawing your attention to August 16th, 2003, at

1 approximately 2:03 a.m., were you so working as a
2 peace officer?

3 A I was.

4 Q What was your position at that time?

5 A Where was I?

6 Q Yes, sir.

7 A I was downtown by the bars on the west side.

8 Q Specifically, where were you?

9 A I was in the 09 -- 100 block of -- 099 block of
10 North 3rd street, kind of right outside the
11 Filling Station by the back because there were
12 some guys being a little bit rowdy.

13 Q Okay. Were you on foot? Were you in a squad?
14 How were you situated?

15 A I was sitting in my squad at the time.

16 Q What direction was your squad car facing?

17 A Southbound.

18 Q So your car was facing south towards Main Street?

19 A Yes.

20 Q Approximately, how many feet north of the Filling
21 Station property?

22 A It was kind of at the back, about where the
23 driveway is to the back of the Filling Station,
24 just south of there.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

11

1 Q As you were sitting there, what, if anything, did
2 you see at the corner of North 3rd Street and
3 Main Street?

4 A I saw two subjects. They came out of the Filling
5 Station around the corner there and started
6 walking toward my direction northbound.

7 Q So you saw two subjects coming around the corner;
8 is that correct?

9 A Correct.

10 Q That's from the patio area outside the Filling
11 Station?

12 A That's correct.

13 Q The exit from the patio area is approximately how
14 far away from the corner of Main and 3rd?

15 A 10 feet.

16 Q As you saw them walking northbound on 3rd Street,
17 could you describe the male that you saw?

18 A The male subject had a blue shirt on. He had
19 like piercings in his face. He was with a
20 female.

21 Q Was the male a white man?

22 A Yes.

23 Q The female that you saw, was she also white?

24 A Female white, yes.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

1 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Counsel, can I ask
2 the witness to speak into the --

3 THE WITNESS: Talk louder, sorry,
4 sir.

5 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Step up. You can
6 bend it down. Thank you.

7 BY MR. O'NEIL:

8 Q All right. What direction were they proceeding?

9 A North.

10 Q As they were coming north, that was toward your
11 squad car?

12 A Correct.

13 Q What did you see?

14 A I saw shortly after that -- when they were
15 walking, they were kind of hurrying north, but at
16 the same time -- about the same time I heard some
17 commotion behind me, and it was just an
18 intoxicated subject making some motions and being
19 loud.

20 So I turned back, and I saw an employee of
21 the Filling Station coming out and was like
22 yelling and chasing after the people that were
23 walking north.

24 Q So you saw someone emerge from the Filling

1 Station.

2 Did you know that person at that time?

3 A Did I know the third subject?

4 Q Yes, the person that came out.

5 A I did not personally know her. She had like the
6 waitress shirt or whatever you want to call it
7 on, and she was going after the people.

8 Q All right. What did you think when you saw the
9 employee from the Filling Station running after
10 the male white and the female white?

11 A My first assumption was that they ran out on
12 their tab, and she was trying to catch them to
13 get the money.

14 Q Did you have a conversation with her, the
15 employee?

16 A Yeah. I eventually -- yeah, I turned my squad
17 around to see if she needed help, and she just
18 told me that she had a phone. She thought the
19 female left her phone behind, and she was trying
20 to stop them to give them back their phone.

21 Q All right. Did she identify herself, the
22 employee?

23 A Yeah. She was an employee at the Filling
24 Station, Ms. Jankowski.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

14

1 Q Lauren Jankowski?

2 A Correct.

**3 Q Did you verify that she was an employee of the
4 Filling Station?**

5 A Yes.

**6 Q So you turned your squad around to go northbound.
7 At that time did you see the male white and
8 the female white?**

**9 A Yeah. As she came out yelling at them, pursuing
10 them, they kind of hurried up and sped up like
11 they were trying to get away, and that's why I
12 assumed that they were trying to get out of
13 their tab.**

**14 Q When you say "sped up," they were on foot;
15 correct?**

16 A Correct.

17 Q But their pace picked up?

18 A Yes. Like they were trying to get away.

19 Q Where did you see them go?

**20 A They went on Cedar toward like behind the Alibi
21 there toward the Breadsmith.**

22 Q What did you do?

**23 A Well, I followed them trying to stop them. I
24 told Jankowski I was going to try and stop them**

1 for her because they were getting away from her.

2 I watched the male and the female -- he
3 kind of hurried her behind -- there was a car
4 parked across the back of Alibi's facing
5 westbound on Cedar right by the Taste of
6 Himalayas there, and they kind of hurried behind
7 there, and then the male in the blue shirt came
8 back toward Jankowski, and the female continued
9 with a different guy.

10 Q Okay. So the male white that you had seen leave
11 the area of the Filling Station with the female,
12 you said he hurried her behind a car.

13 What do you mean by that?

14 A Because they were hurrying already like they were
15 trying to get away from her, so they like hid --
16 almost like trying to hide behind the car. They
17 went behind the car to try and lose sight or
18 whatever.

19 Q So after that the original male white with the
20 blue shirt came back to speak to you and
21 Jankowski?

22 A Correct. I told him that she was trying to stop
23 him, that she had a phone she thought was theirs,
24 and so he went and -- went to make contact with

1 her, and I watched the female and another male.
2 It looked like they were hurrying away still.

3 Q So the original female that you saw leaving the
4 Filling Station was now with a second male?

5 A Correct.

6 Q All right. Where were they going?

7 A They were walking toward the Breadsmith.

8 Q Okay. Pursuant to that, did you go to the
9 Breadsmith parking lot?

10 A Yeah. I pulled into the Breadsmith lot and made
11 contact with them because I could see they
12 were -- as I pulled in, they started walking the
13 other way, in the opposite direction of me. They
14 saw me, and they started walking away from me,
15 which raised my suspicion of what was going on.

16 I could see they were trying to like hide
17 something at their side, and then the male --

18 Q On their side, the side that was facing you?
19 Away from you?

20 A The far side away from me.

21 Q In other words, if I'm walking away from you, it
22 wouldn't be in my right hand, it would be in my
23 left hand to obscure your vision?

24 A Correct.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

1 Q What did you do then?

2 A I could see the male tried to get the female on
3 his far side to hide her, and I could see she had
4 two glasses in her hand at that time, at her
5 side.

6 So I got out of my car and told them to
7 stop, and they kept walking away from me. So I
8 yelled at them again to stop and come back, and
9 they did.

10 Q Did both the female and the male, the second male
11 return then to your squad?

12 A Well, not to my squad, but to where I was, yes.

13 Q Now, the female white, did she identify herself?

14 A Her name was -- last name was Guthrie, if I
15 remember correctly.

16 Q Does Adriana Guthrie sound familiar?

17 A Correct.

18 Q As she walked back towards you after the second
19 time you told them to stop, what did she have in
20 her hands?

21 A She had two glasses that were near full of
22 liquid.

23 Q All right. These weren't plastic. These were
24 glass containers?

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

1 A Yeah. Commonly used at like bars, you know. I
2 don't know what the technical name of them are.

3 Q Based upon what you observed that night, how full
4 were the glasses?

5 A Probably about three-fourths -- three-fourths
6 full.

7 Q Did the liquid in the container -- there was
8 liquid in the containers?

9 A Correct.

10 Q Was there also ice contained inside those two
11 glasses?

12 A Correct.

13 Q Now, the second male white, he was identified as
14 Dennis Lange, Jr.?

15 A That's correct.

16 Q What, if anything, unusual did you notice about
17 him?

18 A He had a bulge in his shirt which you could
19 clearly see was another glass. So I asked him to
20 take it out, and he did.

21 Q All right. And he handed it to you?

22 A Correct.

23 Q What was within that glass container?

24 A The same liquid, whatever it was.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

19

- 1 Q Did the liquid in that glass also contain ice?
- 2 A Correct.
- 3 Q Now, this was on August 16th about 2:03 in the
4 morning; is that correct?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q That's in the summer?
- 7 A Yes, sir.
- 8 Q Was it warm out that night or cold out?
- 9 A Warm.
- 10 Q Did it appear that any of the ice had begun to
11 melt or -- in other words, was the ice still in
12 cube fashion?
- 13 A Yeah. It was still visible.
- 14 Q All right. Now, Mr. Lange told you what the
15 drink that he had was called; is that correct?
- 16 A Yeah. He told me it was a Rainmaker. He said it
17 was basically like a Long Island Ice Tea except
18 with lemonade versus tea.
- 19 Q Did Ms. Guthrie identify the liquid that was
20 contained in the two glass cups that she had in
21 her hands?
- 22 A Yeah. They said they were all the same.
- 23 Q Did you independently, based upon your training
24 and experience, smell the containers?

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

20

- 1 A Correct.
- 2 Q Based upon your training and experience, what did
3 those containers -- what did they smell like?
- 4 A An alcoholic beverage.
- 5 Q Are you familiar with the procedures of the
6 Liquor Commission concerning about when the bars
7 are supposed to stop serving liquor?
- 8 A The time that I'm aware of is 1:20.
- 9 Q 1:20 is last call?
- 10 A Correct.
- 11 Q When are they supposed to start asking patrons to
12 leave?
- 13 A It should be before the 2:00 o'clock time. So
14 everybody should be out before 2:00 o'clock.
- 15 Q The ordinance clearly states that all patrons
16 have to exit the premises by no later than
17 2:00 o'clock a.m.; is that correct?
- 18 A Correct.
- 19 Q Now you were approximately 100 feet north of the
20 corner of Main Street and 3rd Street when you saw
21 the two walk around the corner; is that correct?
- 22 A Correct.
- 23 Q You noted that that time was 2:03 a.m.; correct?
- 24 A About that time, yeah.

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. O'NEIL**

21

1 **Q** **Now, later that evening after this incident or**
2 **just shortly after it, did you have a**
3 **conversation with Mr. Milligan?**

4 **A** I did. I asked the subjects who had the glasses
5 if they would be willing to go back and talk to
6 Mr. Milligan about what he wanted to do, if he
7 wanted to pursue charges against them for
8 stealing the glasses.

9 **Q** **And did they return with you?**

10 **A** Yes, they did.

11 **Q** **Who had custody of the glasses at that time?**

12 **A** The other subject did.

13 **Q** **Okay. You made them walk back?**

14 **A** Yeah. They walked back with me, volunteered.

15 **Q** **Who else was present other than Ms. Guthrie,**
16 **Mr. Lange, and Mr. Milligan?**

17 **A** Ms. Jankowski.

18 **Q** **Okay. Do you know Mr. Milligan from before?**

19 **A** Just from doing bar checks and stuff.

20 **Q** **What did you say to him, and what did he say**
21 **to you?**

22 **A** I asked him if he wanted to do anything about
23 these people who stole his glasses, wanted to
24 pursue charges, and he said no. He took the

1 glasses, and then he went inside -- the glasses
2 went inside.

3 Q He took the glasses from Guthrie and Lange and

7 subjects, the Male White No. 1 and Adriana
8 Guthrie turned the corner at 3rd and Cedar, did
9 you lose sight of these people?

10 A No.

11 Q Is there anywhere in between when you first saw
12 them at 3rd and Main and when ultimately you
13 recovered the glasses full of alcohol up on the
14 Breadsmith parking lot where they could have
15 procured alcoholic beverages named Rain Man or
16 Rainmaker.

17 A No.

18 Q Okay. Had they left alcoholic beverages out in a
19 parking lot somewhere earlier in the evening,
20 would the ice still be in the glass -- still be
21 contained in the glasses?

22 A Most likely not.

23 Q That's based on your training and experience that
24 ice melts on warm, humid evenings?

**BRETT RUNKLE -- 10/14/2013
CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. MILLIGAN**

1 A That's correct.

2 MR. O'NEIL: I have no further
3 questions of this witness.

4 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Thank you.

5 Before we go to cross-examination, does any
6 member of the Commission have any further
7 questions for the officer here?

8 MEMBER GEHM: None for me.

9 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: No, sir.

10 MEMBER AMENTA: No, sir.

11 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Mr. Milligan,
12 cross-examination.

13 MR. MILLIGAN: Sure.

9 front of me or I see somebody urinate in the
10 alley, I'll call it out on my radio to let the

13 A -- so they don't dispatch me to something else.

14 Q So you did a call out when?

15 A When I saw that there was an issue.

16 Q With the alcohol down by the Breadsmith?

17 A No. When there was an issue -- when your
18 employee came out chasing some subjects.

19 Q Okay. Is that time documented somewhere?

21 pulled people over. They said I was just going
22 with the traffic.

23 Have you ever heard that one? Going with
24 the flow of traffic?

1 A Sure.

2 Q Okay. But you pulled them over to give them a
3 ticket, so you know that's a lie; right?

4 A What was that?

22 A I asked them where the glasses came from, and
23 they told me the Filling Station.

24 Q Right. Okay. Do you know if they crossed the

24 MR. MILLIGAN: No.

23 that I could see.

24 Q You couldn't see them with any alcohol. Okay.

2 he turned back from the group and came back to
3 get the phone, did he have any alcohol?

4 A Not that I could see.

10 phone. You know, I was trying to give them the

24 discussed with him?

1 A Yes.

2 MR. MILLIGAN: I have no further
3 questions.

4 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Any questions
5 before we get to cross? Any questions by the
6 Commission?

7 MEMBER GEHM: None right now.

8 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: Yeah. I've got
9 one.

10 When you said the gentleman with the
11 piercings, was that who you referred to
12 previously as the gentleman with the blue shirt?

13 THE WITNESS: It was the gentleman
14 with the blue shirt.

15 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: I mean, there
16 was -- no description referred to the piercings,
17 just a blue shirt. So I'm guessing it's the same
18 guy.

19 THE WITNESS: From my memory, I
20 believe they were both wearing blue.

21 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: Okay. My second
22 question is: So your job -- from my
23 understanding from this line of questioning, your
24 job is to make sure nobody left with alcohol.

1 That was your charge, not fiddling with the
2 umbrella, but it was your charge to make sure
3 nobody leaves with alcohol; correct?

4 THE WITNESS: That is correct.

5 MEMBER PAYLEITNER: Okay.

6 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: Did you wait on the
7 individuals who walked out of the --

8 THE WITNESS: No, I did not.

9 CHAIRMAN ROGINA: You did not wait on
10 them personally.

14 THE WITNESS: Yes.




