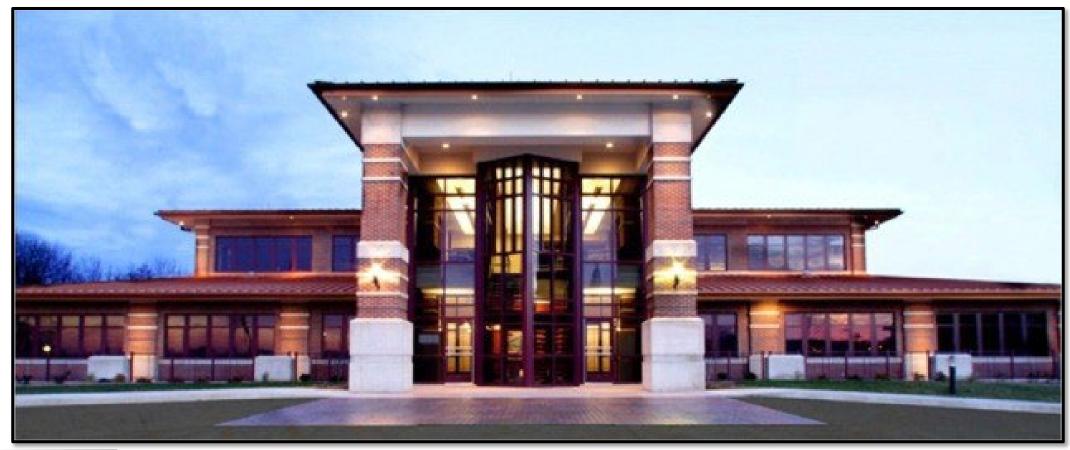
Illinois Municipal Electric Agency (IMEA) Power Sales Contract - Alternative Options



Electric Power Supply Categories for Illinois Municipalities

A. Joint Action Agency (JAA) – "Serving Municipal Owned Utility"

Non-profit agency owned by multiple municipalities who pool their buying power to provide wholesale power supply & related service from power generators through long-term contracts.

B. Power Marketer – "Serving Retail Choice Customers"

For-profit company (often a trading company) buying and selling electricity in wholesale markets.

C. Municipal Utility – "Individual Utility Supplying Own Needs"

Non-profit entity owned by single municipality; Generation, Transmission & Distribution. "Going it alone"





A. Joint Action Agency - "Serving Municipal Owned Utilities"

Non-profit entity owned by multiple municipalities who pool their buying power to provide wholesale power supply & related service from power generators through long-term contracts.

- Options: IMEA, NIMPA, New JAA
- Focus: Long-term Stability Affordable, Reliable and Sustainable Electricity Supply.
- Features:
 - Economies of scale: Lower negotiated rates due to large, combined demand.
 - Shared expertise and resources: Access to experienced personnel and risk management strategies.
 - Transparency and local control: Municipalities have voting rights and oversight over decisionmaking.
 - Measured decision-making: Consensus needed among member municipalities.





B. Power Marketer - "Serving Retail Choice Customers"

For-profit company (often a trading company) buying and selling electricity in wholesale markets.

- Options: Com-Ed "Customer", Competitive Procurement/ Municipal Electric Aggregation
- Focus: Market-based rates on short-term basis using "market mix" power supply.

• Features:

- Market Risk: Potential for price volatility
- Typically only offer short-term power supply contracts (3 Years)
- Variety of Options: Broader range of energy sources and contract terms to choose from
- Less Control: Limited influence over sourcing decisions and market fluctuations
- Profit Motive
- Supplier Risk: Exposed to potential supplier reliability issues





B. Power Marketer - "Illinois Power Agency" - ComEd

- ComEd is a "wires only" company and does <u>not</u> have generation or supply electricity to any customer in Illinois.
- Where do ComEd customers get their power supply?
 Illinois Power Agency (IPA)
 - ComEd (north), Ameren (mid-state & south), MidAmerican Energy (west/ Quad Cities)
 - ComEd customers do <u>not</u> decide where their power comes from, IPA has control
 - IPA was a result of Deregulation changes in Illinois from 1997 2007
 - Each year, the IPA develops an Electricity Procurement Plan to procure electricity for eligible retail customers
 - Short-term contracts are procured through IPA (3 years 33% each year)
 - Power Supply Portfolio





B. Power Marketer - "Illinois Power Agency" - ComEd

- IPA Portfolio is between 7% 11% renewable energy
- Procurements are layered in one-year strips and completed twice per year (spring and fall), dates may be excluded if they are determined to significantly impact the cost of the energy to be procured
- IPA energy is mixed with other market energy and the PJM mix is delivered to all customers at the time it is needed.
- All PJM customers (including St. Charles) receive the PJM mix at the time energy is needed.
- To meet the State of Illinois mandated Renewable Portfolio Standard, the IPA currently procures RECs to become 11% renewable.

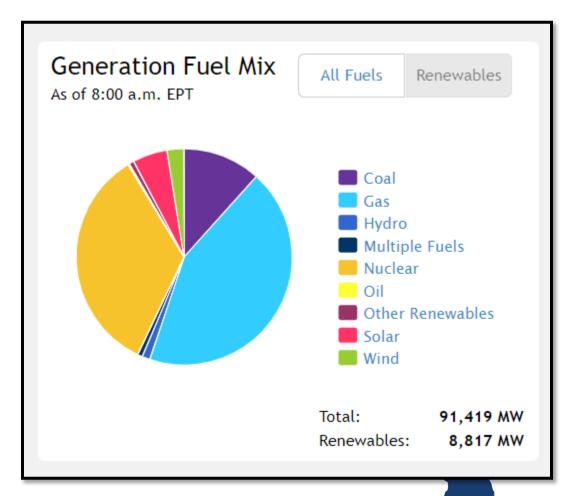

C. Municipal Utility - "Individual Utility Serving Own Needs"

Non-Profit entity owned by single municipality; Generation, Transmission & Distribution

- Options: Springfield CWLP Model, Power Purchase Agreements/ Electric Utility
- Focus: Long-term Stability Affordable, Reliable and Sustainable Electricity Supply.

Features:

- Complete Control: Unlimited influence over sourcing decisions and market fluctuations
- Variety of Options: Broader range of energy sources and contract terms to choose from
- Combination of short-term and long-term power supply contracts
- Opportunity for self-generation
- Many new resources needed including substantial amounts of new staff





Alternative Sourcing Options for Power Supply

1. Join Another Joint Action Agency (JAA)

- Northern Illinois Municipal Power Agency (NIMPA) Batavia, Geneva, Rochelle
 - Established in 2004 w/ Peak Loads of 230 MW (900 MW-1,000 MW for IMEA)
 - No Full Time Employees & No Member Services Management Services from Avant Energy (MN)
 - Prairie State Coal is Only Generation (7.6% ownership) Contract directly with City
- American Public Power Association (APPA) Over 2,000 town/ cities nationwide

2. Form a New Joint Action Agency (JAA)

- 32 of 42 JAA Municipal Electric Utilities in Illinois are IMEA members Economies of Scale & Member Services Advantages
- Most of the other 10 JAA's are <u>IMUA</u> Members
- Additional Resources would be Needed for St. Charles





Alternative Sourcing Options for Power Supply

3. Competitive Procurement (Retail Electric Suppliers – R.E.S.)

- Municipalities conduct own competitive bidding process to solicit proposals from various suppliers/ "trading companies" (Similar to Illinois Power Agency for ComEd Customers)
- Typically Short-term agreements with exposure to market volatility & price stability
- Additional Resources would be Needed for St. Charles
- No Member Services like IMEA

Municipal Electric Aggregation

- South Elgin, Aurora, Carol Stream
- Example: South Elgin
- Short-Term "Retail Choice" Programs Can select from a few different Plans
- Market Rates can be very volitile
- Not an option for St. Charles We own our own Utility



Alternative Sourcing Options for Power Supply

4. Power Purchase Agreements (PPAs)

- Municipalities can enter into long-term agreements directly with energy generators, just like IMEA does.
- St. Charles would have complete control over energy portfolio and costs
- Many Additional Resources would be Needed for St. Charles (IMEA for St. Charles Only)
- Member Services would be St. Charles Responsibility:
 - State & Federal Compliance CEJA Law
 - Legal Requirements ie. Transmission & Sub-transmission Contracts
 - Power Supply Scheduling
 - 24/7 Operating Center
 - Energy Audits

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- Renewable Energy Expertise
- Springfield Example City Water, Light & Power (CWLP) Model

IMEA - Reliable, Affordable and Sustainable Past & Projected Future

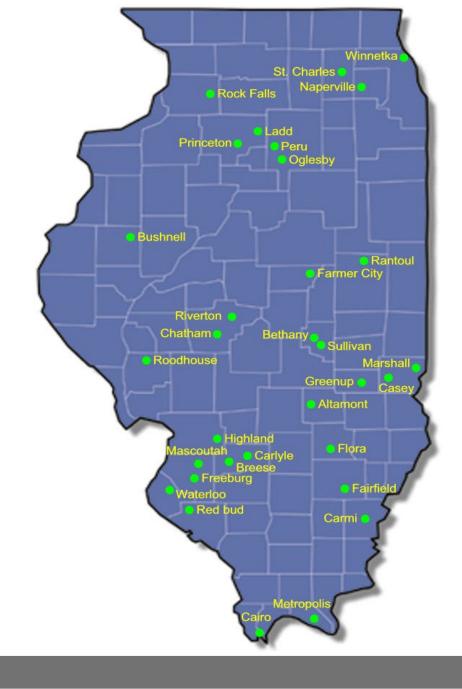
- No viable reason to Join an Existing Joint Action Agency (JAA)

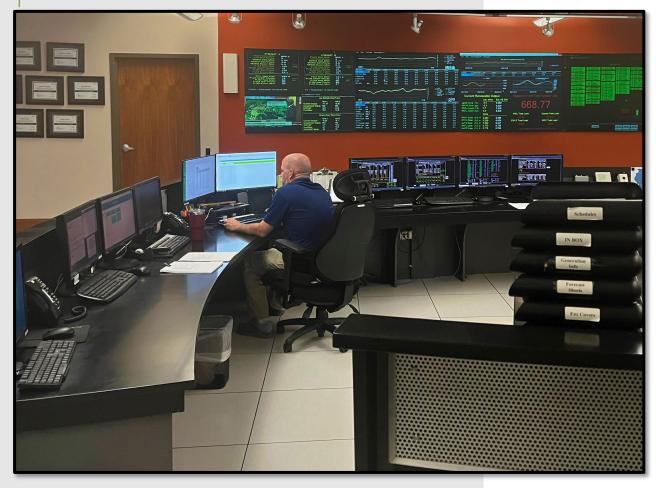

- Founded in 1984 by Municipal Utilities to serve the needs of Communities
- Capacity & Energy is purchased in a Reliable, Predictable and Competitive manner. IMEA secures long-term Capacity & Energy to supply members power needs & spot buying on the open energy market as needed
- IMEA combines the power needs of 32 Municipal Electric Utilities and works for the greater good of all Member Communities as a Nonprofit Joint Action Agency
- Formed & Run by its Members (Local Control)
- IMEA is a 24/7 operation located in Springfield, IL with 32 employees, three separate entities and \$1.3 billion in assets

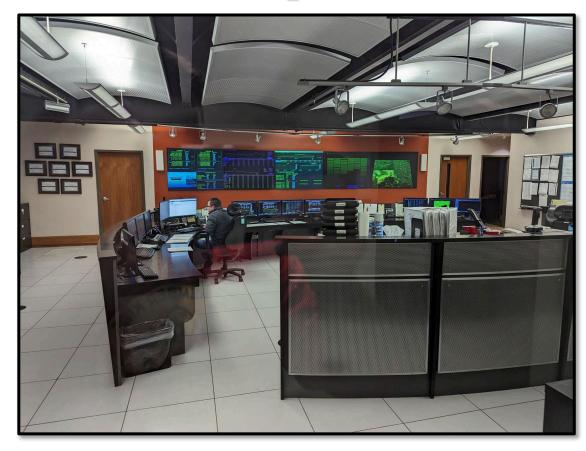

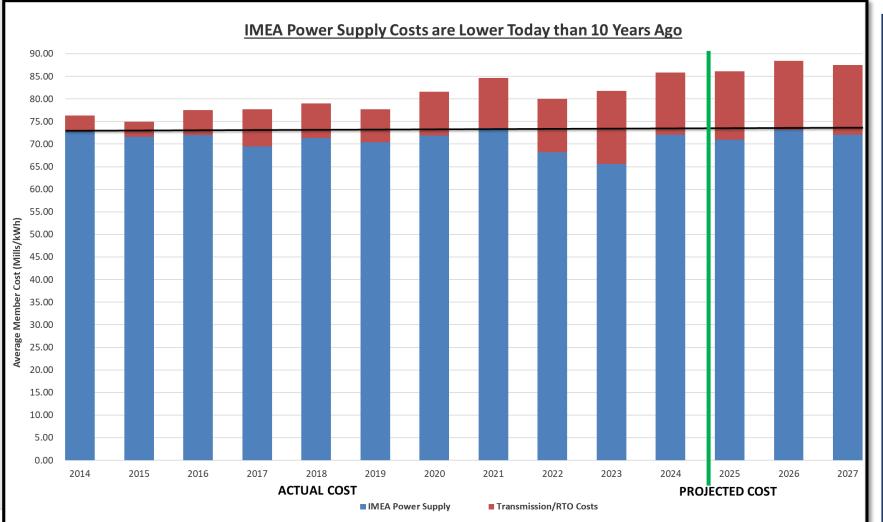
Illinois Municipal Electric Agency Services

- Daily forecasting of energy demand for all members
- Daily forecasting of renewable resource output (wind/solar generation)
- Scheduling of day-ahead power purchases for all members
- Scheduling of day-ahead power sales of generation resources to market
- Real-time monitoring of power market conditions
- Real-time updating of resource dispatch schedules to reduce member average cost of energy
- Real-time communications with MISO/PJM for responding to emergency procedures
- Daily reconciliation of scheduled market participation with actual purchases/dispatch
- Real-time monitoring of energy deliveries to every member delivery point
- Communication with member at the first sign of service interruption
- Communication with transmission entities to ensure service interruptions are as short as possible
- Coordination of behind-the-meter generation with member communities
- Coordination of backup power sources to mitigate interruptions for members with multiple feeds
- Coordination of generation maintenance outages with members
- Communication/Coordination of NERC/MISO/PJM Compliance Issues
