MINUTES CITY OF ST. CHARLES HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION WEDNESDAY, MAY 21, 2025 – 7:00 P.M.

1. Call to Order

Ms. Malay called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

2. Roll Call

Mr. Colby called Roll with 5 members present. There was a quorum.

3. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Colby requested to add an item under Grants regarding 605 W. Main Street.

Ms. Malay requested to add an item under Other Commission Business regarding 801 Indiana Ave.

A motion was made by Ms. Rice and seconded by Dr. Smunt with a unanimous voice vote to approve the agenda as amended.

4. Presentation of minutes of the May 7, 2025 meeting

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Mr. Kessler with a unanimous voice vote to approve the minutes as presented.

5. Certificate of Appropriateness (COA) applications

a. 219 S Fourth Street Unit 3

Ms. Marie Legenski, homeowner, presented COA for window replacement.

Mr. Kessler suggested other options for window replacement other than vinyl.

Mr. Kessler expressed concern that the windows presented do not match the other windows in the building. Questioned if the Homeowners Association has rules concerning the replacement of windows so they are consistent with the building. Ms. Legenski responded that there are no regulations on window replacements.

Ms. Malay asked for clarification if the Permitting Dept asks for HOA approval when applying for

a permit. Mr. Colby responded that Permitting does not ask for HOA approval.

Dr. Smunt added the advantage of using a sash kit is the frame of the window and the trim does not change and will continue to match the other windows in the building.

Mr. Pretz suggested tabling until the Homeowners Association Officers could come in and join in the discussion.

A motion was made by Mr. Pretz and seconded by Mr. Kessler with a unanimous voice vote to table the discussion of COA to replace 7 windows at 219 S. Fourth Street Unit 3 until HOA Officers could attend the Historic Commission meeting.

Mr. Joe Freeman presented COA to replace 20 windows at 5 S 2nd Ave.

Dr. Smunt discussed the design of the current windows and proposed windows.

Mr. Kessler suggested other options for window replacement other than vinyl.

Mr. Freeman told the Commission he would get a quote for fiber glass windows.

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Ms. Rice with a unanimous voice vote to approve COA with frame casing and sash on second floor windows that will match frame and casing on first floor windows.

Mr. Curt Hurst, building owner, presented COA to demo vestibule attached to the southeast corner of the building at $11 \text{ S. } 2^{\text{nd}}$ Ave. The vestibule was put up in the late 70s, early 80s for the dentist office.

Ms. Malay asked if anything different would be done with the exterior of the building. Mr. Hurst said they are working through changes with architects, they have nothing to do with the removal of the vestibule.

A motion was made by Mr. Kessler and seconded by Mr. Pretz with a unanimous voice vote to approve the COA as presented.

Ms. Field presented COA for Carroll Tower, 200 N 2nd Street.

Mr. Colby added there was a COA previously approved except for the dumpster enclosure, this proposal has the steel dumpster screen, and they are limited to what they can use because they are

in the floodplain. The other change is the routing of the accessibility ramps.

A motion was made by Mr. Pretz and seconded by Mr. Kessler with a unanimous voice vote to table the discussion of COA until Applicant can be present at Historic Commission meeting for discussion.

e. 11 N 2nd Ave

Mr. Mark Hernandez presented COA requesting to put a free-standing sign in front yard of 11 N 2^{nd} Ave. The sign will be the same color as the building once the building gets repainted.

Mr. Kessler gave a recommendation to use PVC posts and caps on the sign.

A motion was made by Mr. Kessler and seconded by Mr. Pretz with a unanimous voice vote to approve COA using wood or PVC posts.

6. Grant Applications

a. 605 W. Main St.

Eric Larson, Property Owner, was asked to attend the Historic Commission Meeting to discuss porch railings at 605 W. Main St. The Historic Commission had concern that the handrail was only on one side of the stairs and the porch rail was not installed.

Mr. Kessler stated, to be architecturally correct, he would like to see two handrails on the steps.

Mr. Pretz also would like the rail to be architecturally correct, adding Mr. Larson has been a good steward of the properties and would support going either way.

Mr. Larson stated that it would not be consistent with other properties around this property to have a front rail, the other properties have open corners on the porches. The home did not have handrails when property was purchased.

Dr. Smunt added it is a National Style home with some Queen Anne Style added. Dr. Smunt would support the two stair handrails but does not support the front handrail.

Ms. Rice added the surrounding homes have two handrails by the stairs.

A recommendation was made by Mr. Pretz and seconded by Mr. Kessler with a unanimous voice vote that the scope of the grant plans be changed to have handrails be installed on both sides of the stairs, and no front/porch rail is required.

7. Landmark Applications

8. Preliminary Reviews- Open forum for questions or presentation of preliminary concepts to the Commission for feedback

Rowena Salas, Baker Hotel, opened a discussion concerning approximately 200 window panes that are damaged and will need replacement. Hotel Baker is looking for guidance on replacement and possible grant.

Commission suggested having a site visit to the Baker Hotel.

9. Other Commission Business

a. 801 Indiana Ave.

Mr. Pretz stated at the next meeting he will bring an application but was looking for the Commission's assistance on what the architecture is for the building. Mr. Pretz asked if Commissioners could take a quick look at the building before the next meeting.

10. Public Comment

11. Additional Business and Observations from Commissioners or Staff

Ms. Malay discussed Barry House updates.

Mr. Kessler opened a discussion concerning the Piano Factory foot bridge. It is not in the Historic District, but it needs to be preserved. Mr. Watts, Preservation Partners, stated it is his understanding Public Works will be presenting findings to City Council concerning the bridge.

1. Call to Order

Chairperson Malay called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

2. Roll Call

Ms. Hitzemann called roll with five members present. There was a quorum.

3. Approval of Agenda

Item 9.c- Jones Law Office was added

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Ms. Kramer, with a unanimous voice vote to approve the agenda.

4. Presentation of minutes of the June 21, 2023 meeting

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Mr. Pretz, with a unanimous voice vote to approve the Minutes of June 21, 2023.

6. Certificate of Appropriateness (COA) applications

a. 17 N 2nd Ave.

Ms. Hitzemann presented the application to remove 9 casement windows and replace them with 6 new casement windows and 3 fixed windows. All windows will be vinyl. Also proposed was to install 12 new custom wood fixed combo storm/ screen windows and replace crown molding, head casings and skirt boards with PVC material.

Dr. Smunt questioned whether or not the PVC would be paintable as it should match the existing. He did not want shiny PVC.

Nancy Knapp, the applicant, confirmed that the PVC would be painted to match the existing.

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Mr. Pretz, with a unanimous voice vote to approve COA with the condition that paintable PVC products are used.

b. 200 N 2nd Ave.

Randy Porter, applicant, presented his project to replace the ADA railing, replace the Sunbrella awnings, perform tuckpointing work and add a dumpster corral made of chain link fence with privacy slats.

The Commission expressed that they disliked the use of chain link and would prefer to have a fiber resin, wood or even steel enclosure.

Ms. Hitzemann noted that the area is located within the floodplain, so only certain material or style could be used. She said that she would check with the City's engineers to confirm what material could be used and would relay that to the applicant.

A motion was made by Dr. Smunt and seconded by Mr. Pretz, with a unanimous voice vote to approve the COA for the railings, awnings and tuckpointing with the condition that the corral be removed from the project scope and tabled for a later meeting.

c. 107 W Main St.

Cathal Conaty, applicant, presented his project to install two wall signs, one projecting sign and paint the front of the building black.

The Commission noted that the projecting sign was hard to read and that the text looked out of place. They suggested to modify the text to extend over the full length of the sign.

The Commission also noted that the building was once painted before and the paint failed so miserably that the owner removed all the paint. They conveyed to the applicant that the gloss of the brick really prevents paint from sticking on the brick and advised the applicant against painting it. The Commission noted they are not against the color, and would be open to other ways of obtaining the same effect without causing issues for the brick.

A motion was made by Ms. Kramer and seconded by Ms. Dickerson, with a unanimous voice vote to approve COA with the condition that the projecting sign be removed from the project scope and tabled.

Ms. Malay stated that the porch as been added so nothing was going to be done to correct the issues with the foundation or silt plates. Ms. Hitzemann noted that the grading around the foundation was not yet finished and that should help, but will relay the Commissions concerns to the property parties.

Anticipated Rehab Construction Scope – Construction / work scope includes but is not limited to the replacement of the roof system with 60mil EPDM ballasted roof system, replacement of the storefront window/door combination at East side of Building with aluminum doors and frames, tuckpointing and cleaning of existing masonry, and replacement of entrance ramps and railings at North and South Building entrances. Awnings at East side to be replaced with aluminum frames and vinyl fabric to better withstand tree drippings. All other awnings will be fabric replacement only with Sunbrella canvas fabric and script to match existing. Please see attached specification Section 08 43 13-Aluminum Framed Storefronts for more information regarding materials for storefront window/door replacement. For further details on the above information, please reference Sheet SC1.0.

Note: On 7/12/23 the Commission had previously approved the drawings including the proposed railings, awnings, tuckpointing, and trash enclosure screening. Since the approval, the only changes to the drawings have been revising the exterior entrance ramps to satisfy FEMA requirements. No work has been completed since the last approval. - A. Aluminum-Framed Storefront: Factory fabricated, factory finished aluminum framing members with infill, and related flashings, anchorage and attachment devices.
 - Glazing Rabbet: For 1 inch insulating glazing.
 - Glazing Position: Centered (front to back). 2.
 - Vertical Mullion Dimensions: 2 inches wide by 4-1/2 inches deep. 3.
 - Finish: High performance organic coatings.
 - a. Factory finish all surfaces that will be exposed in completed assemblies.
 - Touch-up surfaces cut during fabrication so that no natural aluminum is visible in completed assemblies, including joint edges.
