ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: Steeply pitched cross gabled roofs where the smaller front gable is even more steeply pitched that the other roofs. This smaller front gable and the side gable are clipped. Decorated barge boards run along the rakes of the gables. All of the walls extend into the gable thereby exaggerating the height of the façade which is typical of the style. The window surrounds are detailed with an elaborate head trim. The porch supports are square columns that feature flattened arches.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: An elevated site contributes to the impression of a large-scale street presence. The 12:12 roof slope adds vertical emphasis. Fish-scale shingles decorate the front gable end of the façade flowing in a fluid manner over the window heads to provide some protection from the elements. The flare at the third story window is a gentle curve. The heads of the second story windows of the front elevation are covered with a small roof that is the continuation of the fish-scale shingles sloping gently out from the main plane of the gable end. A relatively broad frieze board trim was used along the rake of the front gable.

ALTERATIONS: The house was re-sided with a drop styled vinyl siding. The front porch was closed in with windows that are banded together – unlike any other opening in the house. A small one story addition was made to the rear of the house. The front stoop was remodeled using and attractive mix of brick risers and stone treads with wrought iron railings.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: The front gable is the dominant architectural element of the façade. A small-hipped roof supported by ornate wooden brackets tops a one-story bay window on the ground floor of the front gable. Wooden brackets support the overhang and patterned vergeboards decorate the peak of the front gable. Carved wooden brackets support a small-hipped roof over the entrance located off center to the left of the front gable. Modest pediment forms are typically used over the window heads. The front stoop is constructed with native stone and appears to be original construction.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: The roof slope is very steep. It is approximately 16:12 or greater. Fish scale shingles in the gable ends top the two story bays. Large wooden brackets support the deep overhangs here where the corners are cut back and the eaves continue. The eaves are open and are sheathed with smooth wood sheathing. Turned wooden columns support the hipped roof over the front entry. Spindle-work decorates the eave of the porch while the balusters of the railings are square. The windows are trimmed with crown moldings at the head visually supported by bulls-eye "brackets".

ALTERATIONS: The porch railing has been replaced. The entry has an aluminum storm door. All of the original wood windows have been replaced with aluminum.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: The massing of this house similar to the house next door @ 315 South 5th. The plan is mirrored and the system of details differs. This house features a consistent Gothic detail vocabulary. The paired windows on the second floor of the front gable have pointed tops as do the second floor windows on the north and south gable ends. Shaped wooden trim is consistently used around all of the window and door openings. The window head trim is sloped when the sashes are squared off. The front gable end is topped with decorative vergeboards, a broad frieze board, and also features a one-story bay window that has a hipped roof supported by wooden brackets. The front window of the bay has a leaded glass transom. Round Doric columns support the hipped roof of the small porch located over the front door.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: A large, somewhat out of scale, hipped dormer and a wrap-around porch are the dominant elements of the front façade. The south façade features the previously mentioned porch and a two-story bay projection.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: An abundance of spindle-work details articulate the front porch. The roof over the porch is supported by turned columns and prominently features a faceted turret at the corner. The gable ends have the characteristic fish-scale shingles (imbrication). A small curving roof that covers the front picture window in the gable end is also imbricated. The corners of the north gable end are cut away. The eaves are open and are covered with plywood.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: Appears to have used concrete masonry units intended to simulate stone. This was popular in the early part of this century and was thought to be a novel new building material. The roof has symmetrically planned hipped dormers with broad overhangs. The main part of the roof also has the broad overhangs that are emphasized by the broad frieze board detailing beneath the eave. Massive stone piers support the carport and the porch. The stringcourses of masonry located at the 2^{nd} floor line that tie into the carport roof detailing further emphasize the horizontality of the façade. A screened porch located next to the carport is integrated into the main mass of the house.

ALTERATIONS: Aluminum windows replaced the original wooden units.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES: The front gable and the small front porch are the dominant elements of this façade. The street elevation is small scaled, almost cottage like. Two leaded glass windows flank a larger window on the ground floor. Simple square columns and small simple brackets support the roof over the porch that overlaps the front gable. A hipped roof dormer and a shed dormer are placed on the north side of the roof.

ALTERATIONS: It appears that a 1½-story addition was made to the rear of the house that is compatible with the original design. ALTERATIONS: The additions to the rear and the front entry have flat roofs that are non-conforming with the original roofs. The closed in front porch design with the cast iron columns, front doors, and "mansard" roof edge is unsympathetic with the original house. All of the original trim has been covered with aluminum. The bay window on the east elevation was added at a later date.
