This information outlines the activities conducted by members of the Police Department through the calendar year to inform you, the Mayor, City Council, and our community of the great work done by our employees on a daily basis. Our mission is to provide *quality service*, with respect and a commitment to excellence.

2019 saw our dreams become a reality as we moved into our new police facility at 1515 W. Main Street on September 14, 2019. Records Division

Police Records maintains the confidentiality and integrity of police reports, arrest and criminal history information both electronically and on paper. It handles requests for dissemination of information to other agencies, to the public and internally. The actions and decisions of the Police Records staff must comply with all City, Police, State and Federal laws, guidelines and confidentiality requirements. The data processed by Police Records deals with courts and the law, so Records' duties must be performed accurately and in a timely manner, often bound by state mandate.

The Police Records staff manages the front desk for the St. Charles Police Department six days a week, Monday—Friday, 15 hours per day; and 8 hours on Saturdays. The office is closed on Sundays and holidays. Currently, there are six part-time and four full-time civilian staff members that make up the Records staff. The Records Division Manager reports to the Deputy Chief of Administration.

The Special Services Unit (SSU) was formed in July of 2018 and is under the direction of Commander Rich Clark. Commander Clark took over the position from Commander Eric Majewski in September of this year and Commander Majewski was transferred to the department's Investigations Division. Commander Clark oversees special events, traffic, and crime prevention and is under the direct supervision of the Deputy Chief of Administration.

The SSU consists of the following members; 1- Commander, 1- Traffic Safety Officer, 1- Crime Prevention Officer, 1-Community Service Officer, and 13-Crossing Guards (both full and part time). The SSU works to enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors through the safe and efficient movement of traffic in the City. The SSU works in support of the Patrol Division by providing traffic studies and analyses, solving neighborhood traffic and parking problems, and working closely with organizers to plan safe and successful special events.

At the end of 2019, Officer Ben Devol completed his fourth and final year as the Traffic Safety Officer. He will be succeeded by Officer Jerry Schomer who has been selected to take over this position beginning in January of 2020. Officer Devol is a state certified Police Traffic Accident Reconstructionist and will remain a member of the Kane County Accident Reconstruction Task Force. Community Service Officer Ryan Beeter is in his 12th year of service and continues to also assist with evidentiary duties. The Crime Prevention Officer position is held by Officer Jim Burden who is also a state certified Police Traffic Accident Reconstructionist and a member of the Kane County Accident Reconstruction Task Force. Officer Burden has held this position since 2016 and is in his 19th year of service. All three officers are Child Safety Seat Technicians.

Traffic Safety Officer

The Traffic Safety Officer (TSO) is a Sworn Police Officer specially trained in areas such as:

- ⇒ Traffic Crash Investigation and Reconstruction
- ⇒ Truck Enforcement
- ⇒ Solving Neighborhood Traffic Problems
- ⇒ Community Education

Community Service Officer

The St. Charles Police Department has one full-time Community Service Officer (CSO). The CSO is a non-sworn member of the Department who performs a variety of tasks in support of all divisions of the Police Department. Those tasks include but are not limited to:

- Animal Complaints
- Motorist Assists
- Traffic Control
- Parking Enforcement
- Minor Traffic Crashes on Private Property
- Ordinance Violations
- Assists with booking/processing of arrestees
- Responding to other non-criminal Calls for Service

FOLICE ST. CHARLES ILLINOIS

- Daily transfer of documents between the department and agencies such as The Kane County Circuit Clerk, The Kane County State's Attorney, and Tri Com Central Dispatch
- Child car seat checks
- Delivery of vehicles for maintenance and repair
- Transfer of evidence to and from state crime labs
- Evidence processing and property control

In 2019, CSO Ryan Beeter was assigned to 639 calls for service and issued 182 citations for various violations of City ordinances such as parking tickets. CSO Beeter also played a key role in the operations of traffic management at each of the special events held throughout the year.



The Crime Prevention Officer (CPO) is a Sworn Police Officer specially trained in areas such as:

- Traffic Crash Investigation and Reconstruction
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)
- Security Assessment Specialist
- ♦ Community Education

Officer Jim Burden is assigned the duties of Crime Prevention and Crime Analysis, in addition to facilitating the instruction for the "Too Good for Drugs Program" in our local schools. He coordinates the annual Citizens Police Academy, the Youth Academy, Spanish CPA, Elder Watch Program, and serves as a liaison to the Illinois Crime Analyst Association, St. Charles Youth Commission, Kane County Senior Services (Central Kane County-TRIAD), and the Kane County Hoarding Task Force.

School Crossing Guards

The Crossing Guards work each school day to safely cross children at nine different locations. There are 13 guards assigned to the nine positions and there are four additional substitute guards who fill in as needed throughout the year. An additional seven crossing locations are staffed by Community Unit School District #303. The Special Services Unit works closely with the School District to train crossing guards and plan safe

routes to school. The Crossing Guards also help with pedestrian crossing locations during special events. All Crossing Guards attend an annual training session and are outfitted with safety equipment provided by the St. Charles Police Department.

EVIDENCE SUBMISSION AND STORAGE

In 2019 we were excited to be able to move into our new police department facility!

Officers have a new area where they are able

package items of evidence (pictured above). Information about the items are entered into a computer system and a barcode is generated. These barcodes stay with the evidence package throughout its lifetime and help keep track of its location. Once an item is packaged and barcoded, it gets locked into a "one way" evidence locker by the Officer. The items stay secured in the locker until a property custodian checks them into the evidence vault and assigns a permanent



storage location within the vault, keeping a chain of custody or "life history" for each item of evidence.

The property custodian maintains the integrity of all found items and submitted evidence and coordinates future investigative, crime lab submission or court related needs. A single fingerprint can be one of dozens or more items recovered during a single case investigation. Using this as an example, this one recovered print will be handled by on-scene police personnel, an evidence custodian, processing by one or more lab personnel, and upon return, evidence custodian, etc. This all happens before it is to be handled by the States Attorney, possibly viewed by a defense attorney and accepted during trial by the court clerk. This one item has now been handled at least nine times and chain of custody documentation must be completed for each of these individual instances. A single case with 20 pieces of evidence now entails numerous man-hours of dedicated work and recordkeeping that regularly occurs out of the public's view.

Evidence storage requires high levels of organization, effective warehousing type management and maximization of available space while considering health, safety and long term preservation of evidence concerns. Our new



evidence storage facility utilizes moveable high density shelving units (pictured to the left), large rack shelving for oversized items, refrigerators, freezers and a vault room in order to accomplish these goals.

An often overlooked aspect of evidence storage involves our compliance with the numerous laws requiring items be maintained for periods as little as 6 months, up to 25 years or even indefinitely. In 2019 we were able to legally purge 1,138 items of evidence from our storage facilities, while we accepted 1,622 new items during this same period.

Quarterly audits ensure that the integrity of our stored evidence is continuously maintained. Audit results are subject to not only internal command staff review but also that of outside agency inspectors via our on-going CALEA certification process.

MAJOR CRIMES TASK FORCE

Our department actively continues as members of the Kane County Major Crimes Task Force. Police agencies county-wide jointly share specialized/technical resources in order to maximize response to what can be complex criminal investigations. Task force participation is reciprocal in that should our community ever need additional manpower and/or specialized resources then these are only a phone call away.

EVIDENCE PROCESSING

Our new police facility includes a spacious evidence processing area. This area is used by evidence technicians to employ more advanced processing techniques than what is often available at a crime scene.

The processing area includes a cyanoacrylate (superglue) fuming chamber which can be used to reveal fingerprints which are not visible to the naked eye, a fingerprinting down draft table and a macro photography stand for taking close-up photos of developed latent evidence and trace evidence. The processing room also features bright LED task lighting and houses several alternate light sources (ALS) for revealing and photographing unseen evidence such as fingerprints or biological stains. The processing area is equipped with chemicals and dye stains which can be used in conjunction with the forensic ALS to aid in the recovery of evidence.


Casting materials, static electrical charges, and gelatins are available for the recovery and/or enhancement of dust prints or other footwear impression evidence. Chemicals which provide presumptive confirmation testing of drugs and/or suspected blood evidence are also at our disposal.

In addition to an evidence processing area, our new facility also has an evidence garage bay. This is a space large enough and with proper equipment to process a vehicle for evidence. The garage is equipped with a winch,

equipment for lifting a vehicle and lower level LED lighting to aid in photography and recovery of evidence.

DIGITAL EVIDENCE

No area in forensics is growing faster than digital forensics. Electronic devices are becoming more and more a part of our everyday life. New devices are released and changes or updates happen at a whirlwind pace. Storage sizes on our devices continue to increase rapidly. Cell phones have storage capacities of hundreds of gigabytes up to one terabyte! To help the St. Charles Police Department cope with the ever



The digital lab has workstations to process information from cell phones, computers and vehicles. Security and privacy are key for this recovered digital data as it is treated the same as any other type of physical evidence. The digital lab contains a forensic server which holds all of the recovered data. The forensic server and its data are completely isolated from the Internet and even the City and Police Department networks.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG DISPOSAL

2019 marks the ninth year of the prescription drug disposal program and we were able to safely dispose of approximately 179 pounds of prescription drugs during this time. Of this, 59 pounds were collected in partnership with Northwestern Medicine from the DEA's national prescription drug take back day. Our efforts continue to be a great feat, if one stops and considers where these drugs could have gone otherwise if this program were not in place. We continue to promote this environmentally safe and controlled disposal of unwanted or unneeded drugs in order to reduce or eliminate any related drug based catastrophes.

Criminal Investigations

The Criminal Investigations Division serves in various roles. The primary function is to provide investigative support to the Patrol Division. Reported incidents are screened to identify those cases that require additional follow-up that would exceed the Patrol Division resources. Solvability factors such as potential suspects, evidence, crime patterns, etc. are evaluated when determining when to assign a case for additional follow-up work. These assignments would include cases requiring multiple interviews, out-of-town follow-ups, extensive crime scene work, and ongoing surveillance activities. These investigations can vary in duration before a case is successfully investigated or closed. A case is closed or deemed inactive after all potential leads have been exhausted.

The Criminal Investigations Division staffing consisted of the following personnel during 2019:

- ♦ 1 Commander
- ♦ 4 General Assignment Detectives
- ♦ 4 School Resource / Juvenile Officers (one for each of the 2 high schools and 2 middle schools)
- ◆ 1 Narcotics Detective (North Central Narcotics Task Force Illinois State Police)
- ♦ 1 Civilian Administrative Assistant

General Assignment Detectives and School Resource Officers worked 326 cases in 2019, compared to the 276 cases in 2018. The overall criminal case clearance rate for 2019 was 24% with 59 arrests compared to 47 in 2018. 35 cases assigned during 2019 remained in a "pending additional investigation" status at the end of the year.



The following are highlights of cases worked and related job functions performed by investigators in 2019:

- ♦ Execution of numerous search warrants and Grand Jury subpoenas for evidence / property recovery and investigative case support.
- (15) Sexual assault and /or abuse investigations.
- Ongoing compliance based home visits of registered sex offenders, in addition to sexual predator compliance checks during local carnivals, festivals, and child specific holidays such as Halloween. We are proud to announce that there were no compliance violations this year.
- ♦ (1) Online sexual predator investigation.
- Ongoing compliance and license inspections of local massage establishments were conducted resulting in (2) arrests for violating the state massage licensing act in addition to other related local ordinances.
- ♦ (21) Death investigations non-criminal.
- ♦ (1) Armed robbery investigations; compared to (3) in 2018.

Criminal Investigations

- ♦ (10) Motor vehicle thefts; compared to (13) in 2018.
- (54) Burglary from motor vehicles; compared to (77) in 2018 and (68) in 2017. Many of these incidents were entry to unlocked vehicles. Crime prevention press releases, social media alerts and web site reminders were published, alerting the public on ways to protect their valuables.
- ♦ (9) Residential burglary investigations; compared to (19) in 2018.
- ◊ (20) Burglary / Attempted burglary to commercial establishments; compared to (12) in 2018.
- Numerous incidents of criminal damage to property / criminal damage to vehicles.
- Numerous City employment background investigations for probationary police officers, firefighter / paramedics, and dispatcher candidates.
- ♦ Liquor license and business renewal applications; liquor, massage and video gaming establishment site inspections; licensing background investigations, and special event applications.
- ♦ Numerous assists to outside agency investigations.
- ♦ Tobacco establishment compliance checks were ongoing throughout the year. There were (4) citations issued for underage tobacco sales compared to (3) in 2018. St. Charles Police Department works closely with vendors to provide educational information and insure continued compliance.
- Numerous investigations involved thefts, retail thefts, deceptive practices, credit card fraud, identity thefts and other assorted fraud based offenses. (17%) of the cases investigated by detectives in 2019 were based on some form of theft, fraud or deceptive practice, compared to (10%) in 2018.
- St. Charles Police Department works closely with the Cook County Regional Organized Crime Task Force (CCROC), our Federal partners, and other area task forces and investigators to identify individual offenders and organized groups involved in high dollar retail thefts, frauds, and other pattern crimes. CCROC is a partnership between numerous retail organizations, regional law enforcement, and prosecutors.



Drug and Crime Tip Line

This link allows citizens to submit drug and crime related information easily and anonymously. The "Tip Line" has proven to be a viable resource and has been actively utilized by residents for a variety of crime related issues. The "Tip Line" also allows for the submission of photographs to assist investigators. These tips are reviewed immediately upon receipt, researched, and assigned accordingly.

Anyone can access the Tip Line on the City of St. Charles website, the Police Department main page, the Investigations Division link, or by simply calling 1-866-378-4267.

In 2019, the St. Charles Police Department started to utilize the Ring doorbell Neighbors Portal. Neighbors by Ring is a free app that brings communities together to help create safer neighborhoods. With real-time crime and safety alerts directly from residents, law enforcement and the Ring team, the Neighbors app proactively keeps you in the know. Content on the Neighbors app is focused on crime and safety only and moderated by Ring 24/7, 365 days a year.

Criminal Investigations



The D303 School District and St. Charles Police Department agreed to have School Resource Officers in the middle schools which began in the fall of 2019. With the closing of Haines Middle school, the SROs were placed at Wredling Middle School with Detective Nic Anson and at Thompson Middle School with Detective Chuck Crumlett.

Detective Bill Tynan served as liaison to St. Charles North High School and established a new high school club called Law Enforcement Club which meets once a month at the police department during the school

year. Detective Bridget McCowan served as the liaison to St. Charles East High School and is a member of the department's Crisis Intervention Team.

The School Resource Officers oversee juvenile based initiatives for the department to include referrals to the Juvenile Justice System and alternative programs such as community restitution opportunities.

Detective Eric Bauwens again served as a general assignment Detective. He manages the sex offender registration and compliance program for St. Charles, as well as the massage establishment compliance initiative. He also serves as a member of the combined Kane County Accident Reconstruction Team and as an Investigator with the Kane County Major Crimes Task Force.

Kane County

Detective Rob Vicicondi served as a general assignment Detective until his promotion to Patrol Sergeant in September of 2019.

Detective Tim Ocasek served as a general assignment Detective. Det. Ocasek serves as a defensive tactics instructor for the department and is a department representative on the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS).

Detective David Ketelsen served as a general assignment Detective. He also serves as a department liaison to the F.B.I. Terrorism Intelligence Task Force (T.L.O.C.), the Regional Organized Retail Theft Task Force (CCROC), and is a member of the Kane County Major Crimes Task Force.

Commander Chuck Pierce oversaw operations for the Investigations Section until his promotion to Deputy Chief of Operations in September of 2019. At that time, Commander Eric Majewski, previously the Commander of the Special Services Unit, took over the Investigations Section.

In this role, the Commander of Investigations was responsible for coordinating major incident responses and investigations acting as liaison with agencies county-wide and the supervision of organization members and their training.

The Criminal Investigations Division participates in ongoing monthly intelligence and case briefings with several area Investigators Associations. St. Charles has led the Fox Valley Investigators Association monthly meetings for more than 20 years. Investigators from Kane County, as well as surrounding counties, municipalities, and Chicago based federal agencies, routinely attend these meetings at the St. Charles Police Department. The level of cooperation, collaboration, and resources generated by this partnership has provided tremendous benefits to this agency, as well as all involved in this partnership.

The department continues to staff a full-time position with the North Central Narcotics Task Force. That unit was involved in numerous narcotics related investigations throughout the region, in addition to (25) Narcotics related investigations in St. Charles. These efforts resulted in the execution of (9) search warrants, a total of (17) arrests, and the seizure of assorted narcotics, related drug equipment/paraphernalia, weapons, vehicles, and U.S. currency.

Kane County SWAT & ILEAS

The Multi-Jurisdictional Kane County SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) team completed another successful year in 2019. The Kane County SWAT team is comprised of nine different police agencies, two fire departments, and three independent physicians.



As usual, the team added and lost operators.

Entry team operator Stan Towers retired from his SWAT team position after many years of service. The St. Charles Police Department added one new operator: St. Charles Officer Matthew Phillips was added to the SWAT team in April. Steve Woloszyk is currently assigned as a member of the Sniper team. Chuck Crumlett continues to serve as an Assistant Entry Team Leader.

The SWAT team was activated for service on multiple high risk search warrants in 2019, but other than that it has been a quiet year. In October, the SWAT team assisted West Dundee with a suicidal subject armed with a gun and a knife. This callout ended peacefully without incident.

In November the Kane County SWAT team added a new armored vehicle, a Lenco Bear-Cat. It has already been used in multiple operations, as well as training.

The Kane County SWAT team continues to push itself during our bi-monthly training. This year the team trained on firearms proficiency, close quarters battle (CQB), hostage rescue, vehicle assaults, armored vehicle



operation, rappelling, fire suppression, and tactical medicine. All Operators are required to pass a physical agility test twice a year. The SWAT team also conducted an aggressive three-day training course at Fort McCoy in Tomah, Wisconsin.

St. Charles Officers Timothy Ocasek and Michael Karnath are assigned to the ILEAS (Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System) Team, Region 3 North. The team, comprised of agencies from Kane and McHenry Counties, were placed on stand-by

for a number of potential events in 2019 but there were no activated deployments. They participated in multiple training events throughout the year to prepare for day or night time search and rescue, large scale protests, crowd control, and arrest tactics. The team also began training for their anticipated role assisting at the Democratic National Convention in Milwaukee in July of 2020.

Training Overview

The St. Charles Police Department recognizes the importance of training and is continually striving to ensure sworn officers and civilian staff are provided with the knowledge and education to perform their service to the community in a professional and safe manner.

In 2019, St. Charles Police Department personnel received 12,935 hours of job-related training. This number reflects a 24.6% increase in the number of training hours attained in 2018.

St. Charles police officers work a 10.25-hour workday. The 10.25-hour day allows for an overlap day once a week in which all officers are scheduled to work. All officers have been divided into two teams and are provided, on average, with a 10.25-hour training day once a month.

The Department maintains a training goal of 40 hours of training per year for each full time sworn officer. 100% of our sworn officers exceeded that goal. Our commitment to training personnel is proven.

In-house training remains an integral part of our training program. Quarterly firearms training along with tactical simunitions provide our officers with basic firearms handling skills and realistic scenario-based training to place officers in stressful use of force situations to sharpen their tactical thinking and reactions. This group training promotes a team concept and approach to problem solving.

Our annual training program addresses a variety of topics most of which are driven and required by CALEA. These topics include but are not limited to:

- ★ Firearms training and qualification
- ★ Less than Lethal Weapons

Training



State Mandated Training

Recent changes in the law mandated that all sworn officers must receive training in Trauma-Informed Response to Sexual Assault/Abuse. To comply with this mandate, all sworn officers completed online training through the Illinois Training and Standards Board Executive Institute.

NEMRT Training

North East Multi Regional Training continues to be one of the most economical training resources for our Department. In 2019, 51 employees attended 37 NEMRT courses for a total of 960 hours. The annual NEMRT membership is \$95.00 per member.

The St. Charles Police Department hosted six NEMRT classes in 2019, which included De-escalation Strategies for Safe Street Encounters, Breath Analysis for Alcohol, Field Training Officer Refresher, John Reid Interviews and Interrogations, Advanced John Reid Interviews and Interrogations, Domestic Violence/Crisis Intervention, and Law Enforcement Use of Force Review.

Northwestern University Center for Public Safety

Deputy Chief Pierce and Commander Clark both attended the School of Police Staff and Command for a total of 400 hours. Sergeant Vicicondi attended Supervision of Police Personnel for a total of 80 hours.

Accident Investigation/Training and Traffic Control

The St. Charles Police Department is committed to its effort to make St. Charles a safer place to live and work by attending 377 hours of training in the area of traffic accident investigation along with traffic control. Topics of training for this category in 2019 included certification and recertification as Breath Operators, Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement, Marijuana Impaired DUI, Child Safety Seat Technician certification, Standardized Field Sobriety Testing instructor, attendance to the Illinois Impaired Driving Summit, Tire Failure Analysis, Advanced DUI Enforcement, and E-Ticket training.

Investigations

The Investigations Division is continually called upon to investigate a wide variety of crimes and in an effort to stay current with the latest techniques and trends, detectives attended 569 hours of training in 2019 in addition to the monthly in-house training.

Firearms Training/Use of Force

- All sworn officers participated in firearms training conducted quarterly.
- ♦ All sworn officers attended rifle training.
- All sworn officers attended Tactical Simunitions training.
- All sworn officers participated in Control Tactics training held quarterly.
- All sworn completed the annual Use of Force examination.
- All officers completed TASER recertification.
- All sworn officers completed a Pepperball Refresher course.
- All sworn officers completed OC and Baton Refresher training.
- Off duty weapons qualification and training was provided to all sworn officers that own/carry off duty firearms.

Training



In-House Training

The 10-hour schedule provides an opportunity for In-House training at little or no additional expense to the Police Department. In addition to the firearms and use of force topics listed above, the following are topics of instruction provided to all sworn personnel with the exception of those personnel off on benefit time or attending court when the instruction was offered.

The St. Charles Police Department was able to gain additional training by serving as a host site for police training. Forty officers attended a variety of classes free of charge in exchange for the use of the training room and/or the St. Charles Police Department Public Safety Training Facility.

Accreditation

The St. Charles Police Department has been accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) since 1989. St. Charles was one of the first agencies in the State of Illinois to become nationally accredited.

In 2019, the department completed year two of the on-line annual assessment program as part of a 4-year re-accreditation cycle. This year's remote web-based assessment included 81 standards marking the halfway point of all required standards from the CALEA Standards for Law Enforcement Manual. Compliance was verified in each of those areas.

Community Restitution

The Community Restitution Program serves as a not-for-profit work site which operates under the St. Charles Police Department, and is overseen by Francisco Fregoso. Unique to the county and surrounding areas, the program was created to serve as a place where people who committed minor offenses could have the opportunity to work off their sentence in the form of restitution to the City in lieu of serving jail time or paying a fine. The program accepts adults and juveniles who are charged with non-violent offenses.

In 2019, the Police Department inaugurated its new facility. Restitution defendants played an important role in helping prepare, move, and organize boxes and furniture to the new facility. Their participation eased the stress and logistics of managing such an important event.

The new facility is equipped with a hand car-wash and vacuum enabling the restitution program to wash and detail police vehicles on an as needed basis, which saves the City hundreds of dollars each month. In addition to washing vehicles, defendants are responsible for maintaining the cleanliness of an indoor garage which houses police vehicles. Workers also clean and upkeep the Police Department as needed to include: stairwells, gym facility, restrooms, lobby, trash receptacles, and surrounding areas of the Police Department.

The program is operated as a work day. Defendants arrive early in the morning and are assigned tasks which are necessary for the town. These tasks would otherwise be completed by private contractors which would impact the City's budget. The following are examples of some of the noticeable accomplishments for 2019:

- ⇒ Defendants who have a painting background assisted in painting the interior of St. Charles Fire Station 1.
- ⇒ Pressure washed wild animal waste off downtown walkways on a weekly and as needed basis; enabling residents and visitor's scenic views of the river and downtown areas.
- ⇒ Daily pickup of trash from the downtown area, public parking lots, and three parking garages.
- ⇒ Defendants work in collaboration with City departments to assist in cleaning, moving, and performing daily tasks; this allows department members more time to focus on their job responsibilities.
- ⇒ Collected 2,185 bags of trash from 55 right-of-ways.
- ⇒ Emptied over 40 trash bins from around the City on a weekly basis.
- ⇒ Defendants performed over 400 car washes of City department vehicles.
- ⇒ General maintenance at both the Police Department and the department's shooting range.
- ⇒ Mowing and general landscaping as well as snow removal from 18 abandoned or foreclosed properties, and seven City owned properties.
- ⇒ Provided assistance to the Kane County's Recycling program throughout the year. Over 5,300 residents were served and over 386,000 pounds of materials were kept out of landfills and reused or recycled.

In 2019, 227 defendants participated in the program resulting in a total of 5,494.50 hours worked. These hours worked brought a monetary savings to the City of \$91,992.50, which would have otherwise been paid to private contractors to perform the work. This brings the total contribution to \$184,445.50 in free labor since 2017. These figures are calculated using the average of the state minimum wage and an entry level laborer for the City.

Always keeping the City of St. Charles mission statement in mind to uphold the heritage, community, and service above all, the Restitution Program works closely with several departments to identify the needs of the City.


The St. Charles Police Department continues to partner with A.I.D. (Association for Individual Development). Sandra Rincon, employed by A.I.D., has office hours at the Police Department two days a week and works

Her background is in crisis intervention, training in Applied Suicide Intervention Skills (ASIST), and an understanding of bereavement. Sandra's collaboration with the St. Charles Police Department began in April of 2019. Since then, Sandra has accumulated a total of 151 cases and 317 clients so far. Sandra looks forward to being a supportive resource to the community.



Special Olympics



The Special Olympics Mission is to "provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with intellectual disabilities, giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, fellow Special Olympic athletes, and the community."*

Special Olympics is a non-profit program

that began in 1968 with a total of 1,000 athletes from the U.S. and Canada. Now there are more than 5.5 million athletes in 193 countries. To date, there are more than 23,000 athletes with intellectual disabilities and nearly 17,000 Young Athletes ages 2-7 with and without intellectual disabilities served in Illinois alone! That service is provided by more than 48,000 volunteers and coaches in 11 regions throughout the state. Special Olympics Illinois does not charge athletes or their families to participate in the program. The program relies on the generous donations from a variety of fundraising activities. The Law Enforcement community has been a long-time partner of Special Olympics through the Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR). LETR has raised more than \$52 million since 1986.





The St. Charles Police Department takes an active role in fundraising and the promotion of this program. Each year a number of events are held throughout the

community to raise much needed funds. Events in 2019 included the *Polar Plunge, Cop on a Rooftop* - in partnership with *Dunkin Donuts, Butter Burgers and Badges* - in partnership with the west side St. Charles *Culver's,* and Zanie's Comedy Night - in partnership with Zanie's Comedy Club at Pheasant Run Resort. It was our 17th straight year of fundraising through the sale of raffle tickets for a brand new custom Harley Davidson Motorcycle.

The department raised \$13,248.77 in 2019 and over \$150,000 for the charity during the past 17 years. All proceeds go directly to Special Olympics athletes and their programs. This would not have been possible without the hard

TRI-COM

During 2019, Tri-Com processed 142,314 inbound and outbound telephone calls, which resulted in 121,874 calls for dispatch. Out of the total calls, 45,573 were calls received via the 9-1-1 emergency number. 66% of Tri-Com's 9-1-1 calls were received from wireless devices.

Staffing

Tri-Com is authorized to maintain 20 full-time dispatchers and two part-time dispatchers. We currently have five immediate openings in the full-time ranks. By the end of the first quarter in 2020, two will graduate from training, and two will start on March 9. Tri-Com will hire at least four new employees in third and fourth quarters of 2020. Hiring and retention continues to be a challenge in this industry with an average turnover of 19% nationwide. Staff plans to revise our testing and training programs in 2020 in an effort to have plenty of candidates in the pipeline when vacancies occur.

Collective Bargaining

The current labor contract will expire April 30, 2021.

Budget

State 9-1-1 revenue to Tri-Com fluctuated this year due to revised proportioning agreements through the Emergency Telephone System Board (ETSB). Tri-Com maintains very healthy reserves and is able to utilize these funds to offset large variations in the year over year costs passed on to the users. Tri-Com received reimbursement for training from the ETSB for Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) continuing education.

Fiscal Year 2019 Projects

Radio Infrastructure – the Tri-Com Board of Directors had previously entered into a contract with Motorola to purchase the StarCom21 radio system. Tri-Com worked with Motorola throughout 2019 to have a successful implementation of the system by the second quarter of 2020 for all police and fire agencies dispatched by Tri-Com.

Text to 9-1-1 – Text to 9-1-1 was deployed in Kane County on March 1, 2016. All callers are strongly urged to "<u>Call if they can, text if they can't!</u>" Tri-Com received 12 calls for assistance and 13 accidental calls in the year of 2019.
