
department and EMA were able to assist with overnight security for filming and assistance in moving large pieces of equipment on the city's roadways. This was a very unique and fun experience for the city!

Unwanted Phone Calls



Today, it seems like everyone has a cell phone and regularly receive phone calls from people they do not know. This can happen on someone's cell phone, house phone, or even work phone. It's important to try to protect yourself and your phones as much as possible.

One very important step to take is registering your phone number under the "do not call list". In order

to do so, simply go to the FTC.gov and click the link that says "register for do not call". Not sure if you're registered? Click the link that says "verify registration".

Not only can you register your phone, or check your phones registration status for the do not call list, you can report unwanted calls as well. Lots of people receive phone calls from the same number daily, if not multiple times a day. FTC.gov has a link where you can simply report these phone numbers.

Already registered on the do not call list and still receiving calls from unwanted numbers? Try checking your phone for an option to block these numbers. Most cell phones have a way to block phone numbers from calling and even texting.

Remember, if you answer your phone to an unknown or unwanted phone number, do not give out your information. There are always ways to check the accuracy of what people over the phone maybe telling you. The FTC.gov is a great resource, contacting the source the person may be claiming to call from, and the police department can always assist in uncertain situations.



Spring Safety Tips



Now that spring is finally here, everyone is going to be out and about enjoying the weather! Here are a few reminders to protect yourself and your property during the nice weather!

Remember to roll-up your car windows, lock your car doors, and remove valuables from your car. When leaving the house, make sure all doors are closed and locked, and don't forget about the windows!

A lot of residents leave their garage doors open during the nice weather. Be mindful that it is important to close

the overhead doors especially when leaving the house and at night. The St. Charles Police Department drives around all neighborhoods to ensure garage overhead doors are closed. If an officer finds an open overhead door, a crime prevention notice may be left at the residence. This is a friendly reminder to close your overhead door to prevent any theft or burglaries to your home and vehicles.

The roads may be clear and dry, however, remember to follow the rules of the road. Serious accidents still happen, be alert when driving, go the speed limit, and leave the phone out of your hands.

Pedestrian traffic will pick up as people are out and about enjoying the weather. When driving, be aware of your surroundings, watch for pedestrians, and children. If you are a pedestrian, cross at the crosswalks, wait until you have the right-of-way at a crosswalk with a light, and if out at night, bring a light or wear something reflective for driver's to see you.

Bikes are going to be sharing the road with vehicles during this time of year as well. Both bikers and drivers need to be patient with each other and watch out for one another.

Social Media Challenge

The St. Charles Police Department would like parents to be aware of a new social media "challenge". With social media being popular amongst the younger generation, it is very important that parents are aware of "challenges" and be involved in their child's social media life. One of the latest "challenges" is called the Orbeez Challenge. This is when someone will take an air gun, that can resemble a real gun and add Orbeez water beads to the gun. The person will then fire the water beads at random individuals or property. Occasionally, this may be done while firing the beads from a moving vehicle. This is often recorded and posted on social media. The most common social media site that the Orbeez Challenge has been seen on is Tik Tok. This does not mean that this challenge will not appear on other social media sites as well.

It is important to explain to children that the water beads can cause injury to a person and damage property. As of now, the St. Charles Police Department has not handled any reports of this type of incident. This is an important topic for parents to be aware of. Never seen Orbeez or water beads before? Below is a picture that is similar to what they look like.
