Anne Frank (1929-1945) and her family, fleeing the horrors of Nazi occupation forces, hid in the back of an Amsterdam office building for two years. This is Anne's record of that time. She was 13 when the family went into the "Secret Annex," and in these pages, she grows to be a young woman and proves to be an insightful observer of human nature as well.

Youth Commission Members,

As the current Crime Prevention Officer for the City of St Charles, I would officially like to request funds to help facilitate the planning and completion of this year's youth police academy. This will be the fifth consecutive year we have run this program. This year's academy will run from June 12-16.

The target audience is youth from 13-16 years old. CUSD 303 students who live within the city of St Charles would be given preference, with CUSD 303 students outside the city limits used to fill in the class if necessary. The class will run from 10 a.m. to 3 pm daily, and a daily schedule is in the works. Class topics will include a tour of the police station and fire station, a briefing on what police patrol is like, what constitutes a crime, S.W.A.T., Internet/Personal safety, a Taser overview, and C.P.R./First Aid certification.

The class will once again with a graduation ceremony during which certificates of completion will be issued. The classes will be taught by volunteer instructors, however, there is a cost associated with the C.P.R. certification. The fire department has advised the cost to certify will be \$25.00 each, and we have decided to once again limit the class to 25 students.

I am requesting funds in the amount of \$1,125.00 for the following:

C.P.R. and First Aid Certification... 25 certifications at \$25.00 each = \$625.00

T-Shirts with PD Logo = \$400

Other assorted class materials = \$100

The youth academy classes have been well received since its inception, and it's evident that this class is a great benefit to the youth, and in turn, the community of St. Charles. Any assistance you can provide would be greatly appreciated.
