Lewis: I was curious if you had applied for a Class E6 license in the past, or is this the first time?

B. Recommendation by Ald. Stellato and seconded by Ald. Turner to award Additional Leaf Collection Services to Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc.

Peter Suhr: Good evening, unless there are any questions, this is truly a 'housekeeping' night in regards to an additional leaf collection and pickup that was done at the end of our season. We had some dialog about this at the previous government services commit meeting and because of the late fall of the fall leaves; we decided to move ahead with a final pickup after the collection program ended. We were successful in allowing Kramer Tree Services, our contractor, to come in and have eight separate crews on the Monday following the program and were able to pickup the

entire community in a single day, before the snow fell that evening. This is to seek approval for \$28,400 for that last and final pickup.

Ald. Gaugel: This seems to be the norm, because I seem to remember doing this last year as well. It would be great if we could avoid having the special pickup and short notice. I know in my neighborhood, I don't think there was a ton of participation and from some of the neighbors I spoke with, there wasn't a lot of notice to prepare. Understandably so but maybe there is a way next year we can bid this our and have an option for an additional or, look at the program in its entirety to see if we should extend the range of the program. I know the weather is unpredictable and it's hard to predict what will happen with the weather will do and when leaves will fall. There are still two trees in my neighbor's yard that are still hanging on. We'll never be able to get it right and I hate seeing quick turnarounds on larger dollar items like this. It would be better if we could plan for it. With that said, I think it was well run and there were a lot of people that really appreciated but I don't know if we got the best participation that we really could have if this was started at the beginning of the season and publicized throughout.

Mayor Rogina: Help me with this. If we keep using our program the way it is, we start with the first official announcement as far as leaf collection is concerned, where do we go from there under your plan?

Ald. Gaugel: Either we bid this with an additional option for one additional pickup so we know what the cost is already, in this case, correct me if I'm wrong but we had to ask them for pricing to do the one additional pickup for the one day. Is that right?

Peter Suhr: We do have the price to do the entire town for a single pickup and that was \$108,000 roughly. We did ask to get hourly rate on the crews, but truly we already had that in our bid so it was the same hourly rate if you divided it out based on the other pickups, you could get that-back into that information- from the original contract. Again, we really already had that information upfront.

Ald. Gaugel: Okay, so that's fair. It's the additional, we're never going to hit it right, it's so difficult to hit when the leaves fall and when the last pickup is and when the snow falls and everything else. It would be nice if we had this as a finite service that started on XX dates and ended on XX dates.

Mayor Rogina: If I hear you correctly, the tree service, whomever they may be next season, you're suggesting to staff that they come in with a bid that provides one price with a contingency in the even of slow leaf falling?

Ald. Gaugel: That would be a good scenario, yes.

Ald. Lemke: One of the folks that contacted me said that he would have a lawn service out if I could give him a days notice. Sounds like he had the lawn service out on Sunday and I spent a few hours Saturday trying to connect with the guy and he was thankful. I will say, indifference to the places where I say a lot of leaves on the curb, in Hunt Club for example, going through there today it looks like its already been cleaned up and nothing plugging the gutters, thankfully.

Mayor Rogina: I think that staff has responded very well. I agree that it is tricky when you have these situations but it seems to be unusual situation.

Peter Suhr: I'm not sure that it is really unusual because we did it again last year when we had the leaves fall early in the season and if you recall maybe three or four years ago, we used to have an additional pickup and there was a direct action to move from four leaf pickups to three. That was a conscious choice that we all talked about and discussed for a savings of roughly \$100,000 for that last pickup. We also, at that time, eliminated a brush pickup at that exact same time. We went from eight brush pickups to seven. Now we are back up to eight brush pickups and it sounds like the druthers is to go to four leaf pickups again. If we don't have to do it, we don't need to perhaps but we can still budget for that.

Ald. Lewis: I think it was wonderful that we did this second pickup or final pickup and I received several thanks you and 'what a kind city and responsive city' because we respond when needed. I think coming out of the reserve fund was a perfect use for reserve fund money. When there is an emergency and something out of the ordinary, it happened and that's why we have that money there to do it. I'd hate to see it budgeted and then it would take away from some other projects that we might do and then if we don't use it then, oh well we've got it there. It doesn't seem to happen all the time. So, that's just my thoughts.

Mayor Rogina: Applying that opportunity cost, economic principal. I like that.

Ald. Payleitner: I also want to compliment Public Works on their responsiveness and I received a lot of calls and contact from neighbors. Peter, the extra bonus, if you will, for those with leaves on their trees still, I still have some on my trees, is the bag pickup. That is extended to the end of the year, so that was another great response that this option is still out there as well.

Ald. Payleitner: I still have the same concerns that I had when we talked about it at committee. Since then, through a reach out on my part, there have been neighbors, neighbors in quotation marks, of this that were qualified for the notification but because they are not the landowners, had no idea this was coming along. One of them is the Crystal Loft townhome development. They had no idea and were totally taken by surprise and miffed by it. As well as another neighbor who didn't know about it because they were not the landowners, per say. This is kind of a big deal, especially with three developments going in. Like I said last week with the redevelopment going on in that area, I feel like this was kind of a rush to fill. It wasn't a very creative development use and kink of like we're settling. That is my concern and I look through and read the packet, the findings of facts of the planning commission said that this will not be injurious to the use enjoyment of other properties. Truth be told, the barking dogs will be an issue and the gentleman conducting the sale of the townhomes said "that will be swell when I'm showing people and dogs are barking". So, I know I'm maybe one of two lone voices against this so my concern is moving forward, how are these people protected from that disturbance? Of because it is 'special use' we have to take the barking? I guess that's my concern.

Mayor Rogina: In respect to the comment to the notice, and the notice to people that staff might not be aware of because they are not the owners of the property or there's development to be determined yet. Are you suggesting that you expand our notice? I remember as an alderman when making that argument one time about the amount of feet you would allow a notice to be given to and I know I was shot down at that point in time but that's the way it is. I guess my question is, just thinking out loud, how would you like this to see the notice changed? As far as people or distance?

Ald. Payleitner: I kind of discussed this as well; when you look at when the Loft, they are both before us tonight their resolutions are before us for approval. The townhome development started in August and its been quiet a process and there's probably more to it. The Fydoland has been "Boom Boom" three weeks. I think that it's the timing that bothers me. I get it; staff is restricted by only knowing who the land owners are. It's not their responsibility to go further and if the landowner chooses to notify the tenants and in this case, I'd imagine he wouldn't because it might mess up his deal. I know there are a lot of restrictions put on it by the state. Zoning is all state and I know there was no reason to hold this up and it went through the channels and just one of those things. It was a three week bam bam. I know one of the owners was out of town, one of the people on the property was out of town and couldn't come to the public hearing and I promised to speak for them all. And so this is what I'm saying and asking how can we make sure that the barking stays curtailed and within our zoning.

Mayor Rogina: I don't know if I have an answer to that, I know that we approved several years ago Fydoland coming in initially and I recall some conversations about weather there was concern across the street at the apartments across the street about the barking. Seemed like that's all been, as I speak here, the director of economic development is coming to the microphone.

Rita Tungare: Good evening and thank you. This owner, Robin Massie, is present tonight and if the council has any questions for the business owner she can answer.

Ald. Payleitner: I know we've brought up the concerns about the barking and I was quick to defend because it was a small operation and it was on Main Street and there are different stipulations when you're on Main Street for sound. I'm not sure but I think there were complaints about the barking, am I correct?

Robin Massie: 703 N. Third Ave, Owner of Fydoland No, we haven't had any complaints and I'm not user what complaints you are referring to.

Ald. Payleitner: I think your future landlord as a matter of fact has complained about the barking dogs.

Robin Massie: Not at all.

Ald. Payleitner: Okay, I heard otherwise. Thank you

Robin Massie: Perhaps that is hearsay. We've not had any complaints we've also been in contact with the city planning and they even said to you at the last meeting that there's been no reports of complaints either. As far as we are under stipulation of any noise ordinance as well, if those complaints came in we could be fined as well.

Ald. Payleitner: That's I guess what I'm asking, Rita (Tungare) if there is stipulation that I can convey that and what does our code say about noise?

Rita Tungare: It would have to comply with the noise ordinance, I can't recite it off the top of my head but if the property abuts any residential properties there are more stringent standards in terms of compliance of the noise ordinance. They would have to comply like any other

property in town. We don't have any records of any complaints from the existing facility to date.

Mayor Rogina: Fydoland, as I understand it, sits in Ward 1, is that correct? So, to the two aldermen over there have you had any complaints since its been put into existence?

Ald. Silkaitis: I do remember that we had this same discussion about the barking dogs. I guess it never materialized. We do have our nescience ordinance or noise ordinance and if they do get out of hand, we will deal with it appropriately, correct? I'm going to expect and Ald. Payleitner, I see your point, but we have the ordinance in place and if there's a problem we'll deal with it. Staff will deal with the issues and we'll go from there.

Mayor Rogina: Anyone further?

Ald. Lemke: I would encourage that when we give notice to owners, going forward, that they likewise inform anyone living on their land. It's not easy to enforce but they should be notified also.

Mayor Rogina: Clarify, who notifies? The landlord or the tenant?

Ald. Lemke: The landlord is notified but we encourage them in the notification to further notify their tenants and it doesn't seem like something you can enforce but we should encourage that.

Mayor Rogina: That makes sense, I don't think that staff has problems with redoing the boiler plate language they already have so I don't see a problem with that.

Ald. Lemke: Likewise I was concerned initially about the site on Main Street and that was because of the fact that several of the tenants were aware that this was usage was going to be allowed across the street and likewise, so they spoke our and would know to come forward if there were complaints subsequent to that approval and I haven't heard any either.

Ald. Gaugel: I can appreciate the concerns of the residents around. The Crystal Loft, I think that part of their due diligence when they're moving to that location is to look at what the zoning is around them. The two zoning classifications that are right next to it being BL and M1. M1 could allow for a wide myriad of things that could go in there and I think that it's part of their process to understand what, not only is next to them but what could exist potentially down the road. I don't think this would hamper them. I understand and appreciate your concern about notification and I think that is a valid point and I think that is something we should look at and take seriously but I don't think that Crystal Loft's alone in their planned use-first I don't think they would be hampered by this but second its part of their process that they should look at more than what's there now and what potentially could be there down the road.

Ald. Payleitner: Before this evening, was this an option? No. We voted on allowing kennels tonight, even if they did their due diligence.

Ald. Bancroft: There could be some other loud use, right? Permitted to their zoning. It could be anything.

Mayor Rogina: Alright, anything else?

Ald. Lewis: Well I'm curious that if there, you say there are or were complaints that our code would handle it. But, to the owner, what would you do so that the dogs wouldn't be barking?

Robin Massie: What we have in place now has worked very well. We have trained personnel that can redirect any barking and we keep a limited number of dogs outside and we also don't, as per the ordinance, we also don't allow dogs out any earlier than 7am or past 7pm.

Ald. Lewis: But you're doubling in size. So, you'll have twice as many.

Robin Massie: Yes, that is correct but the way we are set up it is a small town type place. There will still never be more than the allotted dogs that we have outside now. We will have our playrooms on the inside so that we can still maintain the same small number per playroom.

Ald. Lewis: And how many do you allow outside now?

Robin Massie: There are 10 allowed outside at any given time. So when one group of 10 comes in, another group of 10 goes out.

Ald. Lewis: So for three hours or all daylong?

Robin Massie: We rotate all day long.

Ald. Lewis: So all day long there will be 10 dogs outside?

Robin Massie: Possibly. What we try to adhere to is that they go outside at least once an hour. As you can see in the three years that we've been there, there's never been a problem because of the way we train our staff and work with the dogs. And there's never been a problem.

Ald. Lewis: But you're doubling in size and once you double in size then there's more opportunity for more things.

Robin Massie: There is more opportunities but I'm a trained professional and have been doing this for 20 years and that is my experience is as a pack master.

Ald. Lewis: I understand and you do a good job. I don't think anyone is saying you're not it's just that the location that you've chosen now to expand your business that I also am having difficulties with. I don't think that it meets the finding of fact either for the neighborhood and I think you run a good business but I think you've chosen the wrong location.

Robin Massie: I strongly disagree but thank you, I appreciate that.

Mayor Rogina: Anything else? I think we're ready, the motion has been made and seconded and now Chuck (Amenta-Clerk) can call the role.

Treasurer's Report November 30, 2017

MONTHLY COUNCIL TREASURER'S REPORT

For The Period Ending November 30, 2017

Overview

The attached report is a summary of City financial activity from the beginning of the fiscal year through the above date. It is meant to provide adequate information in a form easily readable for members of the City Council to understand the financial status of the City. Definitions of the various report components are shown at the end of the report.

Budget Philosophy

The City budgeting philosophy is that the budget is not a static plan, but a working plan that must be routinely monitored and adjusted as new opportunities develop, prior projections do not materialize, or priorities change. Revisions are always made in the light of maintaining adequate cash surpluses, in accordance with City policies, and not making revisions that will severely hamper future years' operations.

Report Format

The report shows each fund summarized by major categories of revenues and expenditures. Year-to-date and annual projections show where we are today and where we expect to be at the end of the fiscal year. Each column provides meaningful information when compared with other columns. For instance, differences between the revised budget column and forecast column should be noted. The forecast is a calculated projection and the revised budget is a formal budget adjustment. Any material differences between the two should be investigated.

Comments

Property Taxes, Corporate Fund - Generally, we collect approximately 99% of the levy request.

Sale Taxes, Corporate Fund - Sale Tax from retailers are received 90 days after the date of sale. Sales tax receipts year to date were lower than anticipated, making receipts \$147,408 lower than proposed budget.

Franchise Fees, Corporate Fund - Actual receipts are \$233,706 lower than the proposed budget.

Income Tax, Corporate Fund - Actual receipts are \$204,203 lower than the projected year to date budget. These receipts are subject to changes in the economy and can fluctuate from projections.

Hotel Tax, Corporate Fund - Actual receipts are in line with the proposed budget.

Intergovernmental Revenue, Corporate Fund - This line includes all Federal and State grants as well as replacement tax.

User Charges, All Funds - Revenue from user charges for the year are \$1,117,927 lower than the projected year to date budget. These revenues can fluctuate with weather, particularly during the summer months.

Personal Services, All Funds - Personal Services are lower than the year to date budget projection for the year. This is due to the timing of new hires, vacancies and employer pension contributions.

Operating Expenses, All Funds - Operating expenses overall are lower than the budget projection for the year. This is due primarily to timing differences.

Capital Expenditures, All Funds - Capital variances are monitored by the department on a quarterly basis. Due to the nature of large expenditures, a specific date of purchase is sometimes difficult to predict.

Definitions

Reporting Periods - The report shows information for two broad reporting periods, year-to-date (YTD) and annual. Year-to-date is an indication of the status from the beginning of the fiscal year through the period being reported. Under this YTD category, three subcategories are shown. Annual projections show the entire fiscal year and are also broken down into three categories.

Actual - The amount of money actually received or expended from the beginning of the fiscal year (May 1) through the period being

Budget - The revised budget from the beginning of the fiscal year through the period shown.

Last Year - The amount of money actually received or expended last fiscal year for the same months shown under "actual".

Original Budget - The amount originally budgeted and approved by the City Council for the fiscal year in April.

Revised Budget - This is the budget resulting from changes to the original budget. It reflects the most recent formal review and reflects the revisions approved periodically by the City Council.

Forecast - The forecast shows a projection determined by adding the amount actually received or expended to date, plus the months remaining of the revised budget after the period being reported, i.e. annual revised budget - YTD budget + actual.

Permanent Variance - A variance between the budget and forecast which will be permanent and not corrected at a later date.

Timing Variance - A variance between the budget and forecast which will be corrected at a later time during the fiscal year.

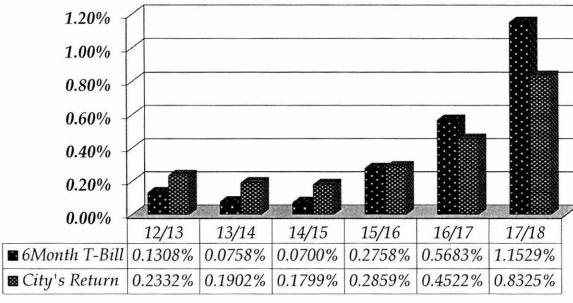

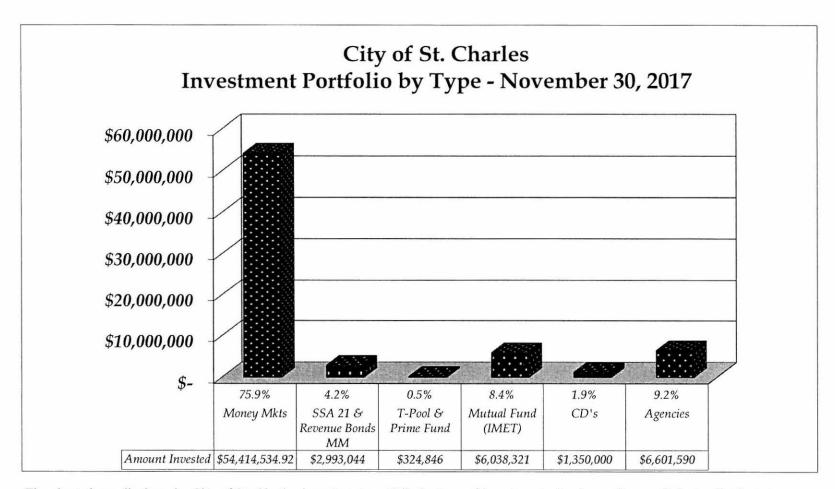


City of St. Charles Investment Portfolio Earnings Comparison

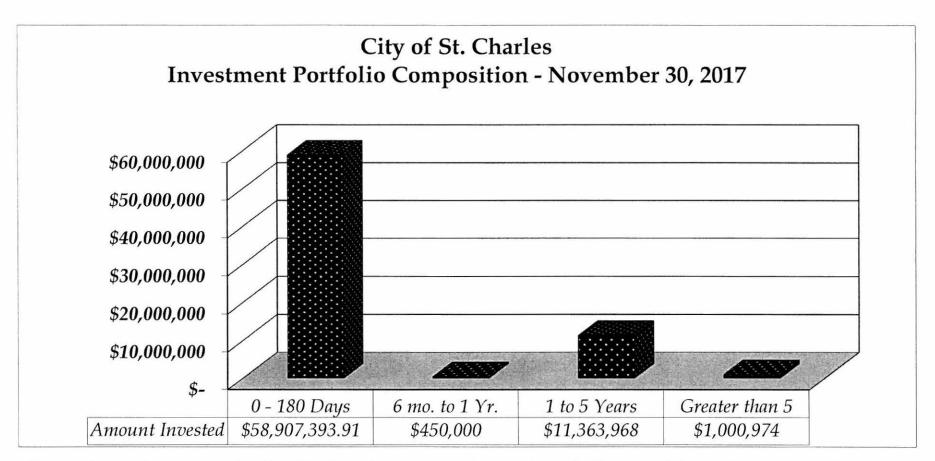




The chart above displays the return on investments for the City of St. Charles portfolio by fiscal year. The Current fiscal year return is computed from May 1 to the current month end. We are comparing the City's return to the average return on the 6 month T-Bill for the same period of time. The City invests in some longer term securities in order to maximize returns. Historically, the City has proven to prevail with this type of philosophy. During sharp rises in interest rates, the City's portfolio may not seem to perform as well, but over time, when combined with the higher returns, the City still comes out ahead. This graph does not include any pension funds.



The chart above displays the City of St. Charles investment portfolio by type of investment. As shown the portfolio is distributed among several investment types. US Treasuries include Treasury Bills, Treasury Notes, Zero Coupon Bonds and Treasury Bonds. The City invests in US Agencies which are government agencies such as Federal Home Loan Bank and Farm Credit Bank. These yield a higher return than treasuries and afford government protection. Money is invested in the Treasurer's Pool, IMET, Commercial Paper and Certificates of Deposit. The City tries to maintain a diversified portfolio to maximize return yet, most importantly, to preserve principal. This chart is only the City's main portfolio and bond investments. SSA 21 and Revenue Bonds money markets are held by Amalgamated Bank in Chicago for investment for those bond issues. This chart does not include pension funds.



The chart above displays the aging of the City of St. Charles investment portfolio. A portion of the City's money is invested in U.S. Agencies, the Treasurer's Pool, commercial paper, collateralized certificates of deposit, as well as IMET (the intergovernmental mutual fund). The City's portfolio is also inflated by bond proceeds which must remain short term to cover construction payouts. The City does invest in some long term securities for capital gains purposes. However, according to policy that amount does not exceed 9% of cost. Timing maturities is very important for the City. We need to allow for cash flow yet maximize return by investing in longer maturities which typically earn a higher yield. Investment maturities are "laddered" as much as possible, to allow for any unforeseen expenditure. The City does not invest funds for the police and fire pension funds, therefore they are not part of this chart.

5.20.110 – Conditions and Restrictions of Licenses

That the following is added to Section 5.20.110 "Conditions and Restrictions of Licenses":

15. Duty to Report. All employees, managers and agents of a massage establishment are mandated reporters and shall immediately report to the St. Charles Police Department without delay any sexual misconduct that is observed or any allegations of sexual misconduct that are reported.

SECTION TWO: That after the adoption and approval hereof, this Ordinance shall (i) be printed or published in book or pamphlet form pursuant to the authority of the City Council, or (ii) within thirty (30) days after the adoption and approval hereof, be published in a newspaper published in and with a general circulation within the City of St. Charles.

SECTION THREE: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days from and after its passage by a vote of the majority of the corporate authorities now holding office, approval and publication in the manner provided by law.

Proposed Modifications

5.20.110 – Conditions and Restrictions of Licenses

That the following is added to Section 5.20.110 "Conditions and Restrictions of Licenses":

15. Duty to Report. All employees, managers and agents of a massage establishment are mandated reporters and shall immediately report to the St. Charles Police Department without delay any sexual misconduct that is observed or any allegations of sexual misconduct that are reported.

Summary

We as a staff feel this addition will strengthen our ordinance as established and have vetted these modifications appropriately with our City attorney. As always, I stand ready to discuss and defend my recommendations accordingly.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A POLICY PROHIBITING SEXUAL HARASSMENT FOR THE CITY OF ST. CHARLES

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly has recently enacted Public Act 100-0554, an Act concerning government, which became effective immediately, dated November 16, 2017;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, each governmental unit shall adopt an ordinance or resolution establishing a policy to prohibit sexual harassment;

WHEREAS, all prior existing sexual harassment policies of the City of St. Charles shall be superseded by the Policy Prohibiting Sexual Harassment adopted by this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, should any section or provision of this Ordinance or the adopted Policy Prohibiting Sexual Harassment be declared to be invalid, that decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance or adopted Policy Prohibiting Sexual Harassment as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the corporate authorities of the City of St. Charles the following:

Section 1. The Policy Prohibiting Sexual Harassment, included as Exhibit A to this Ordinance, is hereby adopted.

Section 2. Exhibit A

ANTI-HARASSMENT

The City of St. Charles strives to create a healthy work environment in which all employees are treated with dignity and respect. Also, any form of discrimination or harassment will not be tolerated. Harassment in the workplace is unacceptable conduct and will not be tolerated by anyone, including any employee, supervisor, elected official, vendor, customer, or any other third party. It is the responsibility of each individual employee to refrain from harassment or discrimination of other employees. It is the right of each individual employee to work in an environment free from harassment.

Prohibited Conduct

This policy prohibits harassment or other workplace discrimination based on an employee's protected status under state and federal law.

Harassment is defined as unwelcome conduct, whether verbal, physical, or visual, that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual based upon that person's race, gender, sex, sexual orientation, age, color, religious affiliation, national origin, physical or mental disability, ancestry, marital status, military status, unfavorable discharge from military service, order of protected status, or other legally protected status. The City will not tolerate harassing conduct that has the purpose or effect of interfering unreasonably with an individual's work performance, affecting an individual's tangible job benefits, or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment. Consensual sexual relationships between co-workers are strongly discouraged. Consensual sexual relationships between supervisors and their subordinate employees are strongly discouraged.

The conduct forbidden by this policy specifically includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Epithets, slurs, negative stereotyping, or intimidating acts that are based on a person's protected status.
- 2. Jokes, kidding, teasing, or practical jokes directed at a person based on his or her protected status.
- 3. Written or graphic material circulated, available on the City's computer system, or posted or distributed within the workplace that shows hostility toward a person or persons because of their protected status.
- 4. Any employee mocking or belittling any other employee.
- 5. The City discourages any such conduct in the workplace, and this policy prohibits harassment based on an individual's protected status, even if it does not rise to the level of a legal violation.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment is a serious offense and is often misunderstood. Sexual harassment includes any harassing conduct based on gender, regardless of whether the conduct is sexual in nature. Any unwelcome conduct based on gender is also forbidden by this policy regardless of whether

the individual engaged in harassment and the individual being harassed are of the same or different genders.

Unwelcome verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature that is severe or pervasive and affects working conditions or creates a hostile work environment constitutes sexual harassment when:

- Submission to the conduct is an explicit or implicit term of employment,
- Submission to or rejection of such conduct is used as a basis for an employment decision affecting an individual (tangible employment action), or
- The conduct has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's work
 performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working environment.
 This policy forbids harassment based on gender regardless of whether it rises to the level of a
 legal violation.

The City considers the following conduct to represent, but are not limited to, some of the types of acts that violate this harassment policy:

- 1. Intentional physical conduct which is sexual in nature, such as touching, pinching, patting, grabbing, hugging, kissing, etc.
- 2. Physical assaults of a sexual nature, including, but not limited to, coerced sexual intercourse, sexual battery, sexual assault, or rape.
- 3. Unwanted sexual advances, propositions or other sexual comments, including, but not limited to, sexually oriented gestures, noises, leering, remarks, innuendo, jokes, or comments or verbal abuse of a sexual nature. Also included are preferential treatment and promises of a preferential treatment to an employee for submitting to sexual conduct.
- 4. Sexual or discriminatory displays or publications anywhere in the City workplace by City employees, including, but not limited to, pictures, posters, calendars, graffiti, objects, reading materials, computers, or other materials that are suggestive, demeaning, or pornographic.

Subtle Forms of Sexual Harassment

The most severe and overt forms of sexual harassment are easier to determine. On the other end of the spectrum, some sexual harassment is subtler and depends, to some extent, on individual perception and interpretation.

Employee Responsibility

Every employee is expected to avoid any behavior or conduct that could reasonably be interpreted as prohibited harassment under this policy. Employees should immediately report observed conduct that is unwelcome, offensive, inappropriate, or in poor taste. The employee should notify his or her supervisor or the Director of Human Resources with complaints about alleged problems or violations of this policy at any time. This policy does not require reporting harassment or discrimination to any individual who is creating the harassment or discrimination. Employees are expected to come forward promptly and report any problems pursuant to this policy before the alleged offending behavior becomes severe or pervasive. Complaints need not be limited to someone who was the target of the alleged offending conduct. Anyone who has

observed an alleged violation of the policy is required to report such conduct. An individual employee who harasses a fellow worker is liable for his/her individual conduct.

Supervisor Responsibility

Each supervisor is responsible for maintaining a workplace free from all forms of harassment and set an example for your employees. This is accomplished by promoting a professional environment and by dealing with harassment like any other form of employee misconduct.

Supervisors must act quickly and responsibly not only to minimize their own liability but also that of the City. Supervisors should inform their staff that such behavior is unacceptable. Supervisors are responsible for ensuring that all of their employees know and understand the law, the harassment policy, and grievance procedures.

Specifically, a supervisor must immediately address an observed incident of harassment or a complaint with seriousness, appropriate disciplinary action, and observe strict confidentiality. Additionally, each supervisor must immediately report to the Director of Human Resources any complaint or observation of conduct which may violate this policy. This also applies to cases where an employee tells the supervisor about behavior considered harassment but does not want to make a formal complaint. A supervisor's failure to make such a report may constitute a violation of this policy.

Supervisors must ensure that no retaliation will result against an employee making a harassment complaint.

Complaints of Harassment

If an employee experiences or witnesses any conduct that he/she believes is inconsistent with this policy, they should deal with the incident(s) as directly and firmly as possible by clearly communicating his/her position to a supervisor, the Director of Human Resources, and the offending employee. This may be done in writing or orally. Each supervisor must immediately report to Human Resources any complaint or observation of conduct which may violate this policy. The following options are available to employees for making a complaint about harassment:

Direct Communication

If there is harassing behavior in the workplace, the harassed employee should directly and clearly express his/her objection, that the conduct is unwelcome, and request the offending behavior stop. The initial message may be verbal. If subsequent messages are needed, they should be put in writing.

Contact with Supervisory Personnel

At the same time direct communication is undertaken, or in the event the employee feels threatened or intimidated by this situation, the problem must be promptly reported to a supervisor or to the Director of Human Resources. If the alleged harasser is the immediate

supervisor, the problem should be reported to the next level of supervision or the Director of Human Resources.

Formal Complaint

An employee may also report incidents of harassment directly to the Director of Human Resources. The Director of Human Resources will counsel the reporting employee and be available to assist with filing a formal complaint. The City will fully investigate the complaint and advise the complainant and alleged harasser of the results of the investigation.

Confidentiality

The City will protect confidentiality by every means legally possible, but confidentiality cannot be completely guaranteed.

City Response

All reports describing conduct that is inconsistent with this policy will be investigated promptly. Employees who believe they have been subjected or exposed to discrimination or harassment prohibited by this policy have the right to have any such activity terminated immediately. The City may put reasonable interim measures in place, such as a leave of absence or a transfer, while the investigation takes place. The City will take further appropriate action once the report has been thoroughly investigated. That action may be a conclusion that a violation occurred. The City might also conclude, depending on the circumstances, that no violation of the policy occurred or that the City cannot conclude whether or not a violation occurred.

If an investigation reveals that a violation of this policy or other inappropriate conduct has occurred, then the City will take corrective action, including discipline up to and including dismissal, as is appropriate under the circumstances, regardless of the job positions of the parties involved. The City may discipline an employee for any inappropriate conduct discovered in investigation reports made under this policy, regardless of whether the conduct amounts to a violation of law or even a violation of policy. If the person who engaged in harassment is not employed by the City, then the City will take whatever corrective action is reasonable and appropriate under the circumstances.

After the investigation is finalized, the Department Director or their designee and the Director Human Resources will meet with the complainant and respondent separately to explain the City's findings and any mitigation to stop and prevent future harassment, if applicable.

Employees are encouraged to use the above complaint procedure(s) to report and resolve their complaints of harassment or retaliation. The City's policy provides for immediate notice of problems to the City employees and officials, so that problems may be addressed and resolved.

Policy Against Retaliation

The City forbids that any employee treat any other employee or former employee or applicant adversely for making a good-faith complaint of harassment; assisting or cooperating in an investigation of a complaint by someone else, whether internally or with an external agency;

filing a charge of discrimination or harassment; or otherwise providing information in a proceeding, including in a court, administrative or legislative hearing, related to violations of discrimination or harassment laws. Examples of the types of retaliation that are prohibited include intimidation; discrimination; verbal or physical abuse; adverse actions with respect to pay, work assignments, and other terms of employment; termination of employment; or threats of any such actions. All employees who experience or witness any conduct they believe to be retaliatory should immediately follow the reporting procedures stated above. No one will be retaliated against, even if a complaint made in good faith is not substantiated.

False Complaints

It is critical in establishing a workplace free of harassment that an individual who experiences or witnesses an incident perceived as being harassing has access to a mechanism for reporting such incidents. At the same time, the purposes of this policy are not furthered where a complaint is found to be false and frivolous and made to accomplish some other end than stopping harassment. False charges refer to cases where the accuser files a sexual harassment complaint that can be proven false. Given the seriousness of the consequence for the accused, a false charge is a severe offense that can itself result in disciplinary action. A false or frivolous complaint does not refer to complaints made in good faith that cannot be proven.

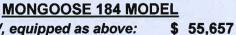

4. Police Department

Chief Keegan: Item 4a is a recommendation to approve a proposal for a new Class A6 liquor license for Anandappa Enterprises, Inc., dba St. Charles BP, LLC located at 1745 W. Main Street, St. Charles. This advanced earlier this evening with a 3 to 1 favorable vote from the Liquor Commission.

This is a new A6 license that was approved several months ago. It's a package license from 7:00 am - 10:00 pm, 7 days a week. The floor space is no more than 10% of the overall gross floor space as far as alcohol sales.

In the background materials you will see noted that there was an arrest of one of the managers about 6 years ago that was completely unrelated to alcohol sales. The police department is recommending favorably that this establishment be licensed.

Ald. Payleitner: You're still waiting on a fingerprinting?

Chief Keegan: We have both back. Other than the one arrest noted there are no other issues.

Ald. Payleitner: It's not 10% of product, but 10% of floor space to be dedicated. I understand that the felony conviction of the manager doesn't apply to liquor; why is it on our application?

Chief Keegan: He's not on the license, but he is a manager of record. We fingerprint and run background on anyone with management authority within the business. Although it's not attached to the LLC or the Dram Shop insurance, he is an agent with the business.

Ald. Payleitner: It says if any of those people have a felony conviction; if it doesn't matter I'm wondering why it's on the application. The other question, are there any gambling convictions, maybe we should say any felony convictions associated with liquor. It looks like we're just dismissing it.

Chief Keegan: I wanted to be honest and bring it forward. This is just one manager that is employed, the conviction was over 6 years ago, and it's completely unrelated to alcohol sales. I've read the report and I don't see a problem with the gentleman's background.

Ald. Payleitner: I agree. I was questioning the process.

Motion by Ald. Stellato, second by Turner to recommend approval of a proposal for a new Class A6 Liquor License for Anandappa Enterprises, Inc., dba St. Charles BP, LLC located at 1745 W. Main Street, St. Charles.

This was advanced from the Liquor Control Commission earlier this afternoon with a 4 to 0 favorable recommendation. I think you all have seen or read some of the Massage Envy information that has been going on in the media. There might have been some conduct over the last several years that was observed and reported, but fell on deaf ears. A lot of us in public service are what's called mandated reporters. Anytime we see or hear neglect or abuse we are mandated to notify the authorities. We would be putting the same onus on the folks that run or manage a massage facility. If they see it, hear it, they have to notify the St. Charles Police Department. I did some research, vetted it through Atty. McGuirk. We are trailblazers in this regard. We're happy to set the trend. You know what we've done with massage and our ordinance to try to legitimize that type of service within our jurisdiction. With that I'd ask for a favorable recommendation to advance this.

Ald. Lewis: I'd like to thank you for looking into this. I'm pleased to see this and according to the news report I saw; this is part of the problem as to why there were these issues. I'm glad we're a trailblazer here. Thank you.

Policy requirements are prohibiting sexual harassment, articulating how an individual can report sexual harassment or an allegation of sexual harassment, prohibiting retaliation against a person for reporting sexual harassment, and articulating the consequences for violating this policy as well as the consequences for knowingly filing a false report of sexual harassment.

The City has had a sexual harassment policy in place for decades, it's broader than just sexual harassment, it covers harassment related to discrimination or harassment related to protected classes. Our policy was reviewed by our labor attorney and was amended to per some of the requirements of this act. That policy has been included in your agenda materials for your review as well as the ordinance that would adopt this policy.
